

BALKAN ALLIES FIRM IN PURPOSE OF DRIVING TURKS OUT OF EUROPE AND DIVIDING TURKEY

OCCUPATION OF PORTE BELEIVED NOW INEVITABLE

Advance of Bulgars Upon Constantinople Unchecked by Peace Talk—Other Balkan States Serve Notice Upon Sultan.

Allies Want All Conquered Territory and Would Force Sultan to Move Into Asia.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 15.—Warning that Bulgaria alone does not have the authority to grant an armistice, and that the other Balkan states must be consulted before such a move can be made, was served on the Porte here today by the foreign representatives. This is indicating that Bulgaria has notified the powers of its determination to occupy Constantinople and that Czar Ferdinand will insist on harsher terms than those already suggested.

Armistice Unsigned
SOFIA, Nov. 15.—Official announcement was made here today that the requested armistice with Turkey has not yet been signed, but that it is prepared and only awaits the arrival of Czar Ferdinand from the front for approval.

Until all the authorized representatives of the Balkan allies sign the agreement, it is announced, Bulgaria will continue hostilities.

It is reported here that the terms of the proposed armistice include Bulgarian possession of Constantinople, Serbian occupation of Monastir, Greek occupation of Jannina, and Montenegrin occupation of Scutari.

Allies Want Territory
When permanent peace is arranged, it is reported, the allies propose to insist on the retention of all the territory they have occupied, the internationalization of Constantinople and Salonika, a big war indemnity and the complete retirement of the Sultan from European affairs.

BUDA PEST, Nov. 15.—Reports from the Bulgarians today say the Bulgars are advancing regardless of peace negotiations. It is reported their vanguard has reached Klios at the Black Sea entrance of the Bosphorus and that the main army is within the Tehatalja lines and advancing on Constantinople. Occupation of the city is believed to be inevitable, as the Ottoman resistance is crumbling hourly.

BELGRADE, Nov. 15.—The Serbian vanguard today captured Debramina, five miles from Monastir. When the main body arrives an attack will be made on Monastir.

PLACING \$5,000,000 BONDS ON TIMBER

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 15.—Frederick A. Brewer, head of the F. A. Brewer company, Chicago, whose specialty is placing timberland bonds, is here for a few days to place at least \$5,000,000 on Oregon timber and lumber manufacturing plants. This is taken to mean that this large sum will be put into circulation in the state in the very near future. Brewer is here in response to a number of applications for loans to develop Oregon timber resources.

CAMPAIGN COST UNCLE JOE \$3299

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—The west reports of campaign expenses received here by the clerk of the house today show that former Congressman Nicholas Longworth beaten for re-election spent \$1578.

BARNUM GRADES RIGHT OF WAY OVER MOUNTAIN

Crew of Thirty-five Men Working on Divide at Head of Poorman's Creek—A. Welch Said to Be Negotiating for Barnum Road.

Surveyors of Medford and Crescent City Railroad Also Locating Line Back of Jacksonville.

Paul Demmer of Jacksonville is authority for the statement that W. S. Barnum owner of the Rogue River Valley railroad is working a crew of 35 men on a railroad grade on the divide above Jacksonville at Poorman's creek. The men are being boarded at his brother's ranch, and Paul Demmer has been supplying them vegetables. He is positive that the men are not of a surveying crew.

The engineering corps of the newly incorporated Medford & Crescent City railroad are busy locating the line of the projected railroad, which has no connection with the Barnum line.

It is surmised that Mr. Barnum is trying to hold the pass through the hill by grading the right-of-way. He recently bonded his railroad and surveyed an extension through Medford. It is rumored he intended to ask a franchise.

It is reported that A. Welch, promoter of the Willamette Valley traction lines now taken over by the Southern Pacific, has been negotiating with Mr. Barnum for the purchase of his railroad. This would mean its eventual acquisition by the Southern Pacific to head off the Hill lines, and the proposed Medford and Crescent City railroad.

The Southern Pacific has promised Grants Pass people to build a railroad to Crescent City at once and negotiations are expected to be completed next week for immediate construction.

FUND OF \$25,000 TO PROBE ELECTION

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Nov. 15.—A movement to raise \$25,000 for the investigation of the election recently held in Los Angeles county is under way today, headed by Rudolph Spreckels, the San Francisco millionaire head of the Wilson committee. Spreckels also plans to investigate the county registration books.

Following the issuance of a writ of mandate ordering the county supervisors to appear in the appellate court tomorrow and show cause why certain Los Angeles precincts should not be thrown out, the supervisors started a recount of all the ballots they had counted so far, in order to prevent any errors creeping in. The disputed precincts were laid aside for later consideration.

TURKS BEATEN BY STARVATION

LONDON, Nov. 15.—"Had the Turkish soldier been supplied with even one biscuit daily he might have held his ground against the invaders," cables the London Telegraph's Constantinople correspondent here today.

"The Turks have been defeated more from starvation than any other factor. The responsibility lies solely with the administrative classes, who, regarding the Balkan states contemptuously, believed the Turkish army invincible.

"The Turkish army has no generals who seem to have grasped the most elementary principles of modern warfare. They have no commissary trains of any sort. Under these conditions the greatest battles of modern times were entered. Not a single field dressing station ex-

TELLS DETAILS OF DYNAMITING TIMES PLANT

McManigal Relates History of Explosion and Implicates Tveitmo and Clancy as Conspirators and Abettors of Crime.

Other Witnesses Verify Details—One Sold Dynamite and Other Canvas Cover.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 15.—Sworn declaration that the first suggestion to dynamite the Los Angeles Times building came from Olaf Tveitmo of San Francisco, secretary of the California Building Trades Council was made by Ortie McManigal here today in the trial of union men charged with illegally transporting dynamite. E. A. Clancy, another San Francisco labor leader, McManigal said, assisted in carrying out the plans.

McManigal testified that full details of the dynamiting were given him by James McNamara on a hunting trip near Conover, Wis. McNamara made his confession, he said, after he had accused McNamara of shooting at him with a revolver.

Tveitmo Implicated
"Jim told me," McManigal declared, "that Tveitmo was the big paymaster on the coast. He said there never was anything to fear out there, for Tveitmo was the friend of Mayor McCarthy of San Francisco—in fact, Tveitmo was the real mayor. It was Tveitmo and Clancy, Jim said, who furnished David Kaplan and M. A. Schmidt to go with him to the Giant Powder company, near San Francisco, to assist in buying the explosive with which the Times building was wrecked.

"Jim regretted that so many people were killed, but seemed sorry that General Otis had escaped. On the way back east, he said, he was frightened because so many people were talking about the explosion and imagining everybody was looking at him. Finally, Jim told me, he could stand it no longer, got off the train at Salt Lake City and remained there for two weeks, hiding in the home of J. E. Munsey.

On Hunting Trip
"I went to Worcester and caused two explosions there on October 9. Then, about a month later, when things began to look bad for Jim, John sent me with his brother on the hunting trip."

McManigal was temporarily excused after finishing his testimony about dynamiting on the Pacific coast, and George Phillips of Oakland, assistant superintendent of the Giant Powder company, was called to the stand. Phillips testified to selling 500 pounds of giant powder September 23, 1910, to three men who arrived at the plant in a boat.

The leader, he said, gave the name of J. B. Bryson and Phillips identified a photograph of James B. McNamara as Bryson. Phillips said he

CLARK TESTIFIES AGAINST FORMER CO-DEFENDANTS

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 15.—De-nounced by his co-defendants as a "liar and traitor," Edward Clark of Cincinnati, a former business agent for the International Association of Bridge and Structural Ironworkers, this afternoon was called to the stand to give evidence against the forty-seven union men on trial here for illegally transporting dynamite. Clark threw a bombshell into the ranks of the defense when at the outset of the trial he suddenly pleaded guilty to the dynamite indictments and announced his intention of turning state's evidence.

Clark shook with nervousness when he took the stand, studiously avoiding the glances of the other defendants. He began his testimony by reaffirming his plea of guilty. He said he met John McNamara in 1905 but did not know Jim McNamara. He met Hoekin, he said, in 1908 and then at the request of the prosecutor pointed out Hoekin from the other defendants. He also said he was well acquainted with F. M. Ryan, president of the Ironworkers' union.

YOUNG ASTOR GETS \$74,000,000 ESTATE

NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—With his coming of age today, Vincent Astor, son of the late Colonel John Jacob Astor, who perished in the Titanic disaster, will assume control of the fortune left him by his father, amounting to \$74,000,000.

Young Astor's first birthday present came from Sheriff Harburger, of New York, who appointed him to membership in the third panel of the sheriff's jury, which has the distinction of being composed entirely of rich men.

SENATOR RAYNOR OF MARYLAND IS DYING

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—Owing to a sudden relapse of Senator Raynor of Maryland, who is seriously ill from neuritis, members of the family are at the bedside here today. Fear is entertained that Senator Raynor will not survive.

LIBERALS PLAN TO DUST LOWTHER FROM SPEAKERSHIP

LONDON, Nov. 15.—Deposition of Speaker Lowther from his position of authority in the house of commons is seriously considered today by leaders of the liberal administration. The charge is freely made in explanation of this action, that the speaker made no serious attempt to check the violence on Wednesday in the house of commons because of his suspected sympathies with the opponents of home rule in Ireland. The liberals predict that violent scenes will continue in the commons so long as Lowther holds the baton.

There is no doubt that Lowther could be dethroned as speaker by the administration, but it is not certain if a successor to his office would be elected without complications which would compel the resignation of the cabinet.

LORIMER TO BE OPERATED UPON FOR APPENDICITIS
CHICAGO, Nov. 15.—Former United States Senator William Lorimer will be operated upon for appendicitis tomorrow by Dr. Arthur Bevan. His general condition is reported to be good.

JOHNSON RELEASED, \$30,000 BAIL

CHICAGO, Nov. 15.—Jack Johnson, negro heavyweight champion of the world, under indictment for violations of the Mann white slave act, was released on \$30,000 bail here today. The bonds were signed by the negro's mother and Matthew Baldwin, a real estate dealer.

Assistant United States District Attorney Parkin said the bonds were satisfactory and Federal Judge Carpenter ordered Johnson's release. The champion was represented by W. F. Anderson, a negro attorney, who succeeded in having the amount of the bail reduced from \$70,000 to \$30,000.

Johnson was present when his bond was approved. He wore a pearl gray overcoat and carried a gold headed cane. "I couldn't stand being cooped up

GENERAL DENIAL OF MURDER PLOT BY DAGO FRANK

NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—Taking the stand in his own defense against the charge that he aided to murder Gambler Herman Rosenthal here in front of the Hotel Metropole "Dago" Frank Cirofici today made general denial of the charge. He declared he did not even know Rosenthal. He corroborated the story of other defendants, saying that "Bald Jack" Rose lured them to the scene of the murder in order to incriminate them.

Cirofici declared that the only purpose "Whitey" Lewis, "Lefty Louis" Rosenberg and Harry Horowitz, "Gyp the Blood," had in going with him to the Metropole on the night of the murder was to satisfy themselves that Rose had not "framed up" a case to land "Big Jack" Zelig, their gang leader, in jail. Cirofici closely followed the story of the killing already told by the other defendants.

SILVER HORN MINE CAVES IN, BURYING SIX

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Nov. 15.—It is reported here today that the famous Silver Horn mine at Frisco, Beaver county, Utah, caved in from the 300 to the 1200 foot level, and that between six and twelve men are missing. No confirmation of the report can be obtained.

SUPERINTENDENT AT COUNTY FARM FIGHTS FOR LIFE

Unknown Maniac Stops at Poor Farm and Seizing Rifle Attacks Mrs. Pace, Wife of Superintendent—Pace Routs Him After Battle.

Police on Lookout for Man Who When Last Seen Was Fleeing Toward This City.

J. N. Pace, superintendent of the county farm is recovering today from a terrific battle with a maniac at the farm Wednesday evening, at which his life and that of Mrs. Pace was at stake. Mr. Pace succeeded in wresting a rifle away from the stranger and with it drove him from the place. The man was last seen going toward Medford and the authorities are now on the look out for him.

Wednesday evening the man, who is described by Mr. Pace as a short heavily built man, dark complexioned, called at the poor farm. He entered into a conversation with Mrs. Pace and during the course of this talk he made an insulting remark. Mrs. Pace resented this and leaping for a rifle he attacked her. Mr. Pace called by her cries of alarm appeared on the scene and immediately grappled with him. Then ensued a terrific battle. Mr. Pace finally succeeded in wresting the rifle from him. With this advantage he succeeded in driving the man from the place. A few shots, judiciously placed, hurried the man down the county road toward Medford.

Mrs. Pace states that she believed the man drunk at first but his strength and the manner in which he handled himself during the fight with Mr. Pace led them to later believe the man was out of his mind.

Mrs. Pace is suffering severely from the shock but was not injured bodily.

GIRL BURIED IN UTAH MINE CAVE-IN

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Nov. 15.—Caught in by a cave-in of the famous old Horn Silver mine at Frisco, Beaver county, two pretty girls, Misses Daisy and Hazel Alexander, aged 16 and 19 years respectively, daughters of Roy Alexander, the mine foreman, with eight miners and two male sightseers, this afternoon are buried beneath thousands of tons of earth and rock. Rescuers working in fifteen relays succeeded in restoring communication with five members of the imprisoned party, including the two girls. They were located at a spot near the 300 foot level.

"We are not injured," was the word sent up the tube by Miss Daisy Alexander. "We have the lunches of some of the miners and a little water. We are not suffering."

UNTIMELY DEATH EXPOSES SCANDAL

BOSTON, Nov. 15.—An autopsy performed here today over the body of Miss Marjorie Powers, a stenographer, found dead in a bathtub in the Revere House here showed that she died from natural causes. A statement to this effect was issued this afternoon by Medical Examiner Magrath.

"Miss Powers," he said, "was not murdered. Neither did she commit suicide. Death was due to natural causes—enlargement or dilation of the heart."

Miss Powers was found dead yesterday afternoon in the room which she had occupied the night before with A. T. Cummings, a wealthy produce dealer, by whom she was employed. Cummings was arrested pending the outcome of the autopsy.
