CHAMP CLARK SURE OF OWN REELECTION

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—Enthusiastic over the possibilities offered the democratic party by the election of Governor Woodrow Wilson to the presidency, Champ Clark of Missouri, speaker of the house, arrived here today. He appeared certain of re-election, asserting that he had pledges of support from half of the next congress members.

Clark also announced that he favored an extra session of congress. It should be called right after Wilson's inauguration, he said, so that the democratic promise of an immediate tariff revision could be fulfilled.

Other Witnesses Testify

Frederick Adolph of San Francisco a tent and awning dealer, followed Phillips. He testified that he sold Caplan two tarpaulins in September, 1910. Afterwards, he said, he identified the tarpaulins as those covering the explosives seized after the dynamiting of the Times building.

William Boehm, McManigal's uncle, told of Ortie's visit to Bloomville, Ohio, in June, 1907. He corroborated part of McManigal's testimony, admitting that he furnished Ortie with the dynamite for his first job—the destruction of the Russell wheel foundry company at Detroit. Boehm, who is a quarryman, also told of subsequent visits McManigal made to Bloomville. In 1908-09, he said Ortie obtained from him a number of sticks of dynamite, fuse and caps.
