William Boehm, McManigal's uncle, told of Ortic's visit to Bloomville, Ohio, in June, 1907. He corroborated part of McManigal's testimony, admitting that he furnished Ortic with the dynamite for his first job-the destruction of the Russel wheel foundry company at Detroit. Boehm, who is a quarryman, also told of subsequent visits McManigal made to Bloomville. In 1908-09, he said Ortic obtained from him a number of sticks of dynamite, fuse and caps.


