

FOOTBALL STAR DRIVEN INSANE BY OLD INJURY

TACOMA, Wn., Nov. 10.—Harry Asseln, former University of Minnesota football star, whose skull was slightly injured in a game between his alma mater and Chicago university seven years ago, is today insane as the result of the injury and is on his way to the asylum at Fort Steilacoom.

Asseln was forced to leave the university before he had finished his course on account of his mental trouble, according to his own story told to the board of examining physicians yesterday afternoon.

He married in Minnesota and came to Anacortes, Wn., where his wife and three children now reside.

A short time ago he left his family, coming to Tacoma where he lived a recluse for several days, being discovered by J. F. Hiatt, a Christian Scientist. Hiatt reported the matter to the prosecuting attorney's office, filing a complaint of insanity against Asseln.

A Punting Exchange

The third period opened with a punting exchange, which ended with Flynn booting to mid-field, where S. Baker fumbled. Avery of Yale picked it up and ran to Princeton's 35-yard line before he was downed by Pendleton. Then, resorting to a kick formation ruse, Spaulding attempted a forward pass but failed. Flynn next tried for a place kick goal and also failed, losing the ball to Princeton.

Princeton punted to the center of the field. On the next formation neither side was able to gain, although punting was resorted to repeatedly. With Yale in possession of the ball on Princeton's forty-five yard line, Flynn tried for a place kick goal but the ball fell short. Neither side scored in this quarter.

Score: Princeton, 6; Yale, 3.

In Fourth Quarter

J. Baker returned Flynn's twenty-yard punt when the fourth quarter opened. Neither side was able to gain and both repeatedly punted. Dewitt booted to mid-field behind goal line. On the twenty-yard line Yale indulged in a lively scrimmage, and when unable to gain, once more punted. The ball zigzagged back and forth, until just before the game ended Yale caught a punt on her own forty-five yard line. By a forward pass, Flynn to Sheldon, she gained twenty yards. Two more passes were attempted but failed. Pumpelly, Yale's right half, who had replaced Philbin, dropped a field goal from the fifty-yard line. The ball hit the goal post and bounced over. Time was called a moment later.

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AUSTRIAN CONSUL SLAIN BY SERBIANS

VIENNA, Nov. 16.—Information regarding the fate of the Austrian consul, Prochaska, who had trouble with the Serbians when they entered Prirend and subsequently disappeared, was demanded of the Serbian government today by the foreign office here.

It is rumored that Prochaska was murdered by Serbians. Unless news is received soon, it is feared the situation will become serious.

Austria believes the Serbians massacred Albanians in Prirend, and that many sought refuge in the Austrian legation, where Prochaska refused to surrender them.

CHINESE SMUGGLER SENTENCED TO YEAR

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Nov. 16.—Captain John Osterhulz was sentenced today by United States Judge Van Fleet to serve one year in the county jail and to pay \$1,000 fine and to remain in jail until the \$1,000 was paid at the rate of \$3 a day. This is the limit punishment for the particular charge under which Osterhulz was convicted. He could not be tried on a conspiracy charge because he was alone on the boat that brought up the Chinese and had no co-partners in the crime.

The offense was landing twenty-two Chinese on the shore of San Francisco Bay near Hunter's Point. They were brought from Ensenada, Mexico, on the sixth of last month. Judge Van Fleet in rendering judgment said that no sympathy should be shown to the white men who land Chinese, because the latter were brought in and sold into practical bondage like the slaves before the war and were compelled to live a life of peonage.

KIDNAPED CHILD FOUND MURDERED

BUFFALO, N. Y., Nov. 16.—Missing since October 2, the body of Joseph Josephs, seven years old, was found here today buried in a vault in the suburb of Lackawanna, and the police are looking for his slayers.

When the child disappeared it was believed he had been kidnapped. His father, a grocer, recently offered \$1,000 reward for news of his child. Yesterday he received an unsigned postcard marked Chicago, saying the boy had been murdered and was hidden in the vault. The dead child was found exactly as the card described.

The socialists are jubilant at the great gain made by the party since the election four years ago. They polled approximately 800,000 votes this year.
