John F. Rogers, mayor of Eileen, who has been visiting Butte, Mont., for some time is expected to return home soon.

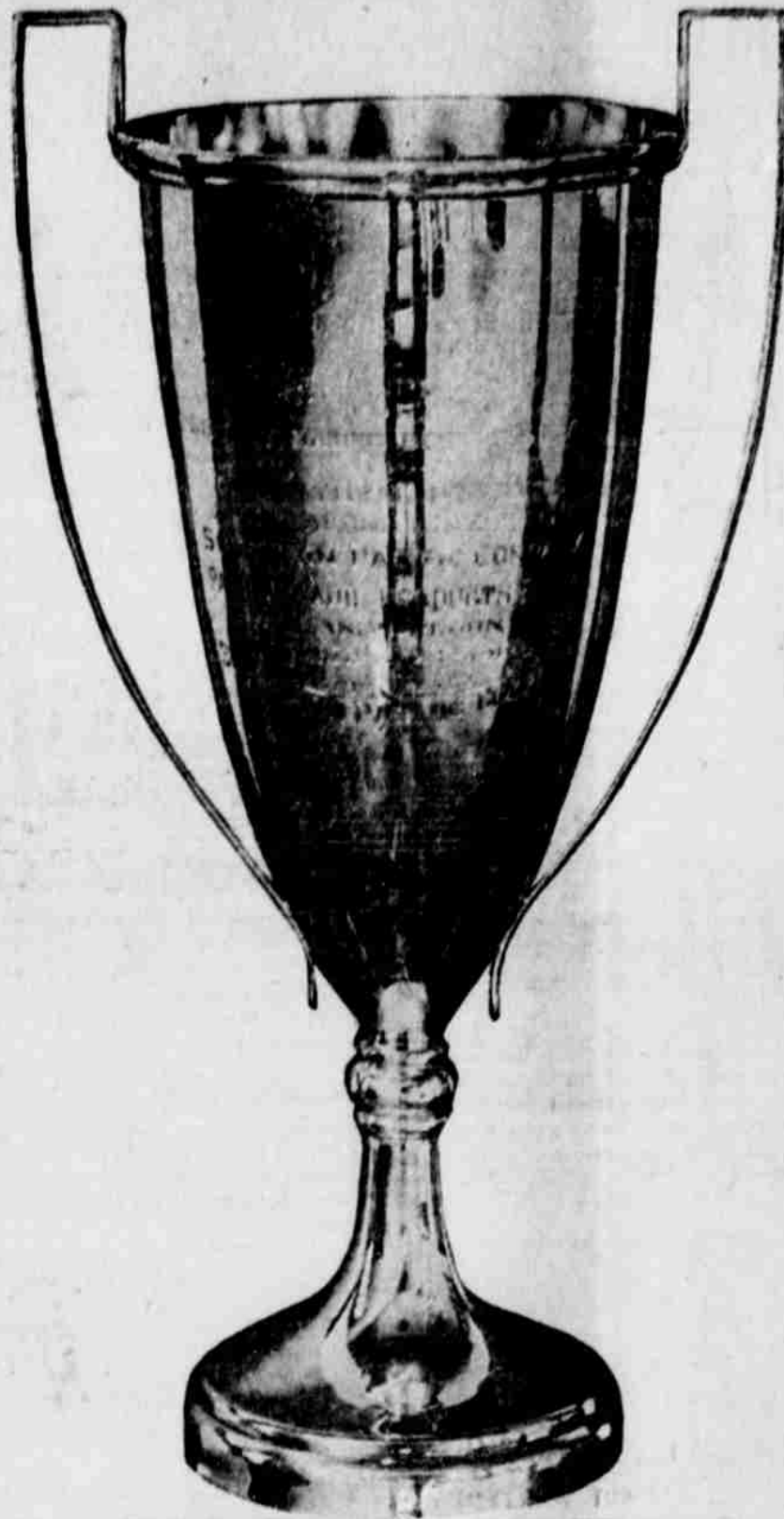

EXTRA SESSION TALK SENDS STOCKS DOWN

NEW YORK, Nov. 16.—Although the tendency of the stock market was downward at the opening here today initial changes in most cases were small. The announcement that an extra session of congress was to be called is responsible for the selling. An irregular price list from London caused a yielding tendency which was intensified later. Some stocks which it was expected would be affected by tariff revision declined, in some cases, three points. A brisk upward movement was noticeable during the last half hour of today's session. The market closed steady. Bonds were steady.

COLLEGE TO DISPLAY SOILS OF OREGON

PORTLAND, Nov. 16.—Workmen are today busy on a monster display to be made by the Oregon Agricultural college in the northwest land show to open Monday. The college display will occupy the entire basement in the exhibition building, the same to show the nature and growing quality of Oregon soils. More than 1,000 booths are being erected in the main show. On the same day the Pacific International Dairy show will open at the Union Stock Yards.
