FOOTBALL SEASON NEAR END; ONLY ONE GAME LEFT

With the final gridiron games of the big eastern and western teams scheduled for next Saturday, the football season of 1912 will soon pass into history. Only one championship game—the Yale-Harvard contest—remains to be played. By downing the husky Minnesota warriors Saturday, the undefeated Wisconsin team won the western championship. Only the Iowa team remains to be played by the Badgers, and the Hawkeyes have been easy victims for both Chicago and Minnesota. The dope on the big game of the year favors Harvard. The best Yale could do with the Princeton Tigers Saturday was a six to six tie, while Harvard downed Princeton several weeks ago. With the season practically over the "Big Four" teams of the east rank as follows: Harvard, Yale, Princeton and Pennsylvania. In the west the teams of the "Big Eight" rank in the following order: Wisconsin, Minnesota, Chicago, Illinois, Iowa, Purdue, Indiana and North Western. Chicago and Minnesota will fight it out for second place Saturday, while Purdue and Indiana will battle for seventh position.

SUPREME COURT DENIES FLOYD ALLEN'S APPEAL

RICHMOND, Va., Nov. 18.—The supreme court of Virginia denied today a motion for a retrial in the cases of Floyd Allen and his son Claude, condemned to be electrocuted Friday for the part they played in the murders by the Allen gang in the Carroll county court house at Hillsville. Friends of the convicted men are urging Governor Mann to commute their sentences to life imprisonment, but it is not believed he will interfere.

ARTILLERY TO END MEXICAN REBELLION

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 18.—Determined to stamp out the revolution in Oaxaca, federal artillery shelled and destroyed several small towns in the northern mountains of that state, according to reports of the war department today. As further evidence of the government's determination to restore peace as early as possible, a high Mexican official announced the transfer of 3000 soldiers now operating in the north, to the states of Mexico, Puebla, Guerrero and Oaxaca.

OREGON SYSTEM ELECT NORRIS IN NEBRASKA

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—An example of the effectiveness of the Oregon plan in choosing senators is that of George W. Norris of Nebraska, who according to the figures here today, was elected by 20,000. Wilson received a majority of 30,000 votes. Under the old plan Norris, who is popular, probably would have been defeated by the partisan vote, but by his non-partisan candidacy direct appeal to the people was successful in landing the toga.

ASHLAND WINS SECOND GAME

For the second time this season Ashland's heavy football team took the lighter Medford aggregation into camp Saturday, this time to the score of 26 to 12. Superiority in weight coupled with the fact that Ashland's field is on a hillside, was responsible for the defeat. Medford at all times played gamely and once had the ball within a few feet of the goal line when time was called. As it was the local boys slipped across two clean touchdowns. The two teams will play here later in the season and with a dry and level field Medford should make the game interesting.

FEDERATION BARS RELIGIOUS TALKS

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Nov. 18.—Religious discussions at future conventions of the American Federation of Labor will be permitted. After a red-hot debate on the convention floor here today, the resolution committee reported adversely of Emil Arnold's resolution barring future religious discussion and the delegates adopted the committee's recommendation. Arnold's resolution was intended as a rebuke to Father Peter Dietz of Milwaukee who last week defined the Catholic position on socialism. The socialistic element caused surprise by voting against the Arnold resolution. The resolution presented by Samuel Gompers, the president of the federation, favoring arbitrating all international disputes and condemning war, was passed.

YREKA SALOON IS ROBBED BY BANDITS

YREKA, Cal., Nov. 18.—Posses are searching the hills near here today for two masked bandits who entered the saloon of Victor E. Warren, at Hill and after lining up fifteen customers, looted their pockets, secured more than \$1,000 from the safe, a \$1500 diamond from Warren and escaped. Warren at first refused to obey the command to hold up his hands and fired four shots at the thieves. Three shots were fired in return, but no one was hurt. The bandits then compelled Warren to open the saloon safe.

PARTIAL DEFEAT FOR HOME RULE

LONDON, Nov. 18.—Another partial conservative victory was gained in parliament today when Premier Asquith was forced to agree to an entirely new financial clause in the home rule bill. The premier was forced to agree although personally convinced that re-consideration would be the best method of eliminating the unsatisfactory clause introduced by the Hanbury resolution. The conservatives are expected to resume their obstructive tactics in opposition to the new clause.

SAY BALKAN STATES PLAN TO CREATE REPUBLIC

TACOMA, Nov. 16.—Local citizens who came from the Balkan or Austria-Hungarian states have organized to raise \$5,000 to send to the Red Cross society to help Balkan soldiers and their families. There are 10,000 such residents here and they expect if the Balkan states get free from Turkey they will organize a republic which will be joined by the Austrian states, also under oppression.
