Dennis & Sons of London issue the following dated Nov. 1:

Arrivals this week in London of colored box apples have been very considerable, particularly from Wenatchee, Jonathans at the beginning of the week ranged from a to 9d but these figures have not been possible at today's sales and it looks as though values will rule next week at from 6s-6d to 7s.

We have had a quantity of boxes of Winter Nellies from Oregon on the market and prices have ranged from 12s to 14s-6d, bulk 12s to 13s.

The "Salvatore di Giorgio" brought this week to London about 10,000 barrels of Nova Scotian apples. Low prices have been realized and the prospects of the "Happahannock" cargo early next week are not bright.

The Liverpool market on barrel apples is slightly lower generally than last week. They have not had much box fruit their.

Grapes—One hundred and twenty cars. The grape shipment represents a falling off of more than 50 per cent since last week. The season is now nearly done. There are a few Emperors from the Fresno district still to go forward. Should nothing unexpected occur the movement will probably be concluded during the coming week. Emperors have been in strong demand and have sold unusually well. The packing of some of the finest Emperors in the state in sawdust is still going on. These grapes will be in fine condition for the holiday trade, and we are sure the trade will be more than pleased with them.

Weather during the week in the southern San Joaquin district, from which the principal shipments are being made, has been favorable.

LOW GRADE ORE MAKES GOOD RETURN

One hundred and thirty dollars' worth of gold was exhibited in Grants Pass Saturday as the result of a forty-eight hour run of the mill on the property of the Jump-Off-Joe Mining company twelve miles from Grants Pass, says the Courier.

This company which took over the old Oro Fino mine is most encouraged over the showing that is being made since the installation of the mill. A great amount of development work had been done on the property before the new company took possession of it, and the ore upon which it is now working is part of 3000 tons that was put into the discard by the previous operators.

As the ore was taken from the tunnel the high grade was sacked and shipped, while that of lower values was put into the dump and is what is now being ground into wealth.

SUFFRAGETTE ARMY COMES: ASQUITH GOES TO COUNTRY

LONDON, Nov. 18.—The suffragette army, which started from Edinburgh on October 12, completed its 400-mile tramp to London Saturday, having taken exactly five weeks to journey under the leadership of Mrs. De Pont Blaque, who traveled horseback. They went immediately to the prime minister's residence and presented a petition demanding suffrage for women. Premier Asquith, profiting from his experience of previous meetings, had retired to the country for the week end. His secretary, however, accepted the document. There was no untoward incident.

FREIGHT RATES BILL CARRIED STATE BY LEAD OF 12,000

Complete returns from the state with the exception of Malheur and Harney counties, show that the Medford rate bill swept the state by a vote of 56,899 to 44,719. The measure carried every county in the state with the exception of Wheeler where it lost by five votes only. Wheeler county is one of the counties in the state without a railroad.

The home rule road bill lost by a vote of 61,725 ayes to 37,672 nays, the majority against being 24,053. The bill lost in every county but Coos, Curry, Jackson and Klamath. In Curry it only carried by four votes.

The majority for woman suffrage is larger than earlier figures indicated, the returns for all counties except Malheur showing it is 48:37 ahead. The amendment authorizing an income tax, which has been in doubt, is carried to victory, 1915 votes to the good, with two counties to be heard from that cannot change the result.

CENTRAL POINT GIRL BREAKS ARM SATURDAY

Miss Ruth Manning, a young woman of Central Point, suffered a broken arm Saturday night when cranking her automobile. The handle bar slipped from her grasp, striking the right arm above the wrist and causing a severe and painful injury. She was rushed to Sacred Heart hospital in this city, where medical aid was called, and the wound dressed by Dr. Conroy. Miss Manning is well known in Medford.

WOMEN AT ASHLAND WILL VOTE ON DECEMBER 17

ASHLAND, Ore., Nov. 18.—Ashland women will cast their first vote December 17 at the city election. Not only are they eligible to vote after the governor's proclamation, on completion of the official count of the ballots, but are also eligible for holding or becoming candidate for any of the offices, but according to head suffrage leaders, they will be content with only casting their vote, as they do not care to pitch into another political fight so soon after their recent victory for suffrage.

HOTEL MEN WANT ROAD CONSTRUCTED TO OREGON CAVES

The Oregon State Hotel association has started a movement for the construction of a state highway to the Marble Caves of Oregon that proves that this great natural wonder is commencing to attract the attention that its importance warrants.

"See America first, especially Oregon," is the slogan of the hotel men of the state, and as one of the places of interest which all America should visit the Oregon caves stand out most prominently. But before they are entirely available to tourists a highway must be built, and the hotel association, through its legislative committee has attempted to interest the members-elect of the coming session of the state legislature in the subject, and to get an appropriation for the work.

The following resolution bearing the endorsement of Phil Metcalf Jr., president of the Oregon State Hotel association, and of F. W. Beach, its secretary, has been received, it having been passed by the hotel men in Portland on the 13th inst.:

"Whereas, it is the policy of this association to aid in every legitimate way the spreading of the propaganda of 'Seeing America First, Especially Oregon.'"

"Resolved, that the legislative committee of this association be instructed to confer personally with such members of the legislature as they may be able to reach and others by mail looking to the building by the state of a highway from the most convenient point on the Southern Pacific railroad to the caves of Josephine county."
