FINAL ARGUMENTS BEING MADE IN TRIAL OF STRIKERS

SALEM, Mass., Nov. 20.—The fate of Joseph J. Ettor, Arturo Giovannitti and Antonio Caruso, on trial here for the murder in Lawrence of Anna Lopizzo, a striker, during the big industrial strike there last winter will soon be in the hands of the jury. Attorney Mahoney is making the final plea for the defendants this afternoon and Judge Quinn is expected to deliver his charge this evening. Then the case will go to the jury.

Attorney Mahoney made an impassioned plea for the defendants, virtually charging that Ettor is the victim of a frame-up.

"The men interested in big corporations," he said, "are often able to remove the law's machinery. Everybody knows that the workers do not receive the same consideration from the authorities that the owners do."

Mahoney also denied that Ettor had ever conspired violence.

SAYS TURKS WILL LEAVE EUROPE

"The Turk to Leave Europe" was presented at the hall on Main street last night to a houseful of interested people. Two lines of prophecy speak directly of the Turkish power. One of these is the ninth chapter of Revelation where symbols are used to give the characteristics of the Turks; the other is the eleventh chapter of Daniel where their literal history is given in advance under the title of King of the North.

In the Revelation it was shown that the Turks came from the desert wastes of Arabia, called here "bottomless pit"; that they were let loose up Eastern Rome by the overthrow of the Persian king Chosroes; and that for five prophetic months, or one hundred and fifty years, their bands pillaged and burned and otherwise tormented that division of the Roman empire. The prophecy said that they should be commanded not to hurt the grass, nor the trees, nor any green thing. It is interesting to note that the historian Gibbon makes their leader issue a command using almost the language of scripture. In 1299 they invaded Roman territory and oppressed the people for 150 years. In 1449 the emperor of the Romans died, and his brother Constantine XIII refused to take the throne without permission from the sultan. Soon after the sultan died, and his successor, Mohammed II determined to make himself master of Constantinople and eastern Rome. The scripture speaks of fire and smoke and brimstone used in their warfare; and the historian tells of the first campaign where gunpowder, cannon, and muskets were used in a siege. They were to continue, says the prophet, a year and a month and a day and an hour, or 391 years and 15 days of literal time. This added to July 27, 1449 would bring the Turkish empire to an end as an independent kingdom on August 11, 1840. On that date the sultan begged the mediation of the powers to settle the war between himself and the pasha of Egypt. Since then the Turks have existed as a nation in Europe only by the sufrage of the great powers.

JAP PLAYER DEFEATS CHAMPION HOPPE

JOHNSON TO LET PRISONERS HANG

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Nov. 20.—In granting a reprieve of two weeks to Edward Delahante, a negro who murdered a fellow prisoner in San Quentin, Governor Hiram Johnson today took occasion to express his policy in regard to capital punishment by declaring that he would not interfere with hangings and that he would not follow the announced course of Governor West of Oregon, who plans to bunch the executions as a terrible object lesson.

"Some months ago," said the governor, "I announced that I would reprieve the various condemned men until the initiative petition for being secured had been filed and the people had been given a chance to pass on the question of capital punishment."

"The petition was never completed and the matter was not presented to the people. Thereupon I announced that the law must take its course. I feel it my duty to uphold every law of the state and I have no more right to abrogate the capital punishment law than any other on the statute books."

WEARS DEATH CAP IN AERIAL HONEYMOON

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 20.—Casting superstition to the winds, Aviator Silas Christofferson is today taking his aeroplane honeymoon trip wearing the cap worn by Aviators Gill and Walsh when they fell to their deaths. Walsh was killed in the northwest and Gill in Chicago. Walsh was present, secured Hill's cap, and when he was subsequently killed, he had the headgear on. At the time of the Chicago mishap Christofferson's brother secured the "sky piece" and today presented it to the daring aviator, with a brief resume of its history. Christofferson said he would wear it throughout his honeymoon aeroplane trip with his pretty young bride.

TURKS RAN AWAY FROM MONASTIR

ENIGMADE, Nov. 20.—The reported capture of 45,000 Turks in the fall of Monastir was discredited today by the dispatches from that city which say that the Moslem garrison did not surrender but fled before the Serbian attack, leaving thousands of rounds of ammunition and other war material behind. Latest accounts of the battle say the Turks lost 20,000 killed and wounded, and that the Serbian casualties were nearly as heavy.

A detachment of Serbian cavalry is reported in close pursuit of the Turks who fled in the general direction of Florina, 20 miles southeast of Monastir. The state entry into the city of the crown prince of Serbia is said to have been delayed until yesterday.

JURY ACQUITS TULL OF ASSAULT CHARGE

Charles Tull, arrested on complaint of Charles S. Lebo, for assault was acquitted Tuesday afternoon in the court of Justice of the Peace Taylor. Tull demanded a trial by jury.

Lebo charged that Tull had knocked him down following a dispute regarding the payment of wages under a contract between the two. Evidence was confusing and this doubtless led to an acquittal.
