

# GATES ANNOUNCES HIS CANDIDACY; FOUR NOW IN RACE

C. E. Gates, "the Overland man," today announced his candidacy for mayor making a total of four to formally announce themselves for the office. His platform is published elsewhere. As the socialists state that they will have a candidate the voters of Medford will have at least five men to choose from.

To date J. E. Watt, J. W. Mitchell, W. W. Eifert and C. E. Gates are in the race. Who the socialists will nominate is not known as yet but chances seem to favor George H. Millar, present councilman, for their candidate. Mr. Millar is conceded to be the strongest man they could name and may be counted upon to make a strong run. In the recent county election he ran 500 votes ahead of his ticket and he drew nearly his entire vote, outside of his party, in Medford.

With the candidates for mayor out with formal announcements, interest is beginning to center on the candidates for council, there being three vacancies to fill and possibly four if it is decided that W. N. Campbell appointed to fill an unexpired term cannot hold past a general election.

Ed M. Andrews Wednesday announced his candidacy for the council from the first ward. Mr. Andrews has a wide acquaintanceship throughout the city and should make a strong bid for the office.

No names have as yet been suggested from the second ward while in the third A. S. Bliton has announced his candidacy. John Demmer is also suggested as a candidate.

# FEDERAL PROBES OF HOSPITAL ENDS

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Nov. 20.—Post Office Inspector Sharp announced here today that the federal probe against physicians and proprietors of maternity hospitals engaged in illegal practices would end this afternoon.

Sharp declared that approximately 100 persons will be arrested in various cities on secret indictments charging them with mailing obscene matter.

# Arrests at Portland

PORTLAND, Nov. 20.—Deputy United States Marshals Griffiths, Duke and Beatty today placed under arrest T. C. Pierce, Mrs. E. M. White and Doctors J. S. Stott, C. H. T. Atwood and A. A. Asplund on indictments sworn to by Chief Inspector Sharpe of the post office department. The federal officials allege that the arrests are in compliance with orders from the post office department for a general round-up of putative quacks in Portland and many other parts of the country. More arrests are expected.

# Nine at Seattle

SEATTLE, Nov. 20.—Nine arrests are to be made here this afternoon on indictments returned by a federal grand jury which investigated the quack medicine frauds here six weeks. United States Marshal Jacoby refused to make public the names of those involved until the arrests are made.

# HARRIMAN DAY AT LAND SHOW

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 20.—Today is Harriman day at the Pacific North West land show. The employees of the general railroad offices and the yards several thousand strong, paraded the streets in grotesque costumes with a band at the head, and are now reveling in the delights of the monster exhibit.

An important feature of the exhibit is the bacteriological department in charge of Professor Beckwith of the Oregon Agricultural College. This is established to show the farmers attending the necessity of absolute cleanliness in the care of their livestock. The other features of the agricultural college seem to be appealing particularly to the strangers.

# PIPES CENSURES WEST FOR USE OF MILITIA

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 20.—That Governor West was not justified in calling out the militia to quell various disturbances when the sheriffs concerned could have handled them is today the opinion of Martin O. Pipes, retiring president of the state bar association, expressed in the annual of that organization. Pipes spoke feelingly on the matter, touching especially on the expense of the governor's procedure.

George N. Davis, circuit judge-elect, declared in the meeting that an attempt should be made to eliminate the "bore" who made the legal profession the butt of his jokes. He recommended a state board of law examiners, and the devising of a system to keep the "halt, lame and blind" out of the profession.

Chappelle, evidently in a state of absent-mindedness, walked through the gate barrier just before it closed, and as the draw was swinging outward, and a moment later he fell from the high pier into the river. His shouts attracted the harbor patrolboat, but it failed to reach him in time. A youth, who would not give his name at the police station, attempted to leap in and save the drowning man, but was held back by the importuning of a pretty girl companion.
