

### SAY WICKERSHAM SHIELDS ARCHBOLD

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—Flat charges that Attorney General George W. Wickersham is protecting John D. Archbold, president of the Standard Oil Company, from arrest on a federal indictment returned in Texas were made here today by Attorney W. H. Gray of Houston. The Texan conferred with Wickersham regarding the indictment, which charges Archbold with violation of the Sherman anti-trust law.

"If a poor devil of a counterfeiter or a 'moonshiner' had been indicted," said Gray, "he would have been 'pinched.' But in this case, where the powerful Standard Oil company is concerned, Wickersham steps in and says: 'I understand the evidence is not sufficient to convict,' and directs that the warrant be not served on Archbold.

"It strikes me that the Texas grand jury and not Wickersham should determine whether the evidence is sufficient or insufficient. The grand jury and a United States district attorney in Texas thought it sufficient. Wickersham's action amounts to a trial of the case by the department of justice and not by a court."

### AUSTRALIANS EJECTED RIOTING IN PARLIAMENT

SYDNEY, N. S. W., Nov. 20.—Most extraordinary scenes were witnessed in the New South Wales house of assembly yesterday. Four members were ejected and four others were named by Speaker Willis. This action roused the ire of Attorney General William Holman, who threatened the speaker with personal violence.

As the government has majority of only one, and Mr. Willis is, although speaker of a labor administration, a liberal, the position of the government is very peculiar. Should the speaker resign, the government would be forced to appoint a speaker from its ranks and this would leave the parties unequal, and probably precipitate a general election.

### FAMOUS DOCTOR DIES DIAGNOSING HIS DISEASE

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 20.—Dr. John C. Sunderberg, aged 69, consul to Bagdad under Presidents Harrison and Cleveland, and later physician to the former Sultan of Turkey, is dead here today.

Always a disciple of science, Sunderberg's end was hastened by an effort to further medical knowledge of the very disease which took his life—hardening of the arteries. He attended a meeting of the King County Medical association Thursday, and took an active part in the discussion of this disease explaining his own symptoms and telling what he had done to promote his life. While talking he collapsed, was removed to the Seattle general hospital and died in a few hours.

### LOS ANGELES MANIAC WELL KNOWN IN UTAH

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Nov. 20.—Albert Henry Davis, the supposedly demented man who armed with six sticks of dynamite, held undisputed possession of the central police station in Los Angeles yesterday for more than an hour is well known to the Salt Lake police.

Davis was arrested here seven years ago on a charge of petty larceny, convicted and sentenced to 100 days in jail. He escaped from the chain gang, pounding the shackles from his foot with a stone, eluded his pursuers. Davis also used the name of Warr Herr.

### CASH REGISTER CO. NOW UNDER FIRE

CINCINNATI, Ohio, Nov. 20.—Charging corrupt practices in the restraint of trade, the case against John Patterson, president of the National Cash Register company and twenty-nine other officials of that corporation was begun here today before Judge Howard Hollister. John S. Miller, attorney for the Chicago Beef packers, is in charge of the defense. The defendants pleaded not guilty.

### VALUABLE HORSE SHOT BY HUNTER

Careless shooting on the part of local sportsmen is said to be responsible for the loss of a valuable horse owned by G. L. Schemerhorn Tuesday. The animal's leg was shattered by a shot and so serious was the wound that Mr. Schemerhorn had the animal shot to put it out of its misery. Mr. Schemerhorn has now declared war on hunters and is plastering his huge pasture with No Trespass notices. He declares it will go hard with the next hunter he catches in his large field.

This is but one of the many instances reported this year of the deadly work of careless hunters. Complaints have come from all sections of the county.

### TAX AMENDMENT LOST AT ELECTION

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 20.—Official figures from all counties but Malheur today denote that the tax amendment, reported at first to have carried in the recent election, lost by about 300 votes. An error of 500 votes in the affirmative returns from Baker county is responsible.

The repeal of the county tax amendment and the household tax amendment were the only tax measures carrying.

### IMPRISONED SNAKE CHARMER PINES FOR REPTILE PETS

SPOKANE, Wn., Nov. 20.—The county jail officials are today puzzled as to how they will dispose of the case of Alex Smith, snake charmer, arrested for "bootlegging," who demands that his three pet snakes be brought to him in his cell. He is plainly showing the effects of their absence. It is against the prison rules to admit the reptiles and a bartender in whose charge Smith placed the snakes when arrested, now threatens to turn them loose on the streets if the authorities do not claim them. The other inmates of the jail gave the jailer three rousing cheers when he refused to let Smith have his snakes.
