

### LOCAL SPORTSMEN PROPOSE CHANGES IN GAME LAWS

At an informal conference between local sportsmen and Master Game Warden Finley Thursday, the following recommendations were made by members of the rod and gun club and Rogue river fish protection association for changes in the game laws:

- Closed season for trout fishing in the Rogue river and tributaries from Nov. 1 or Dec. 1 to April 1 or May 1.
- Quail season to remain as at present.
- Open Dove season from August 15 to September 15.
- Two weeks open season for Chinese pheasants.
- Open season on deer from Aug. 15 or September 1, to Nov. 15 or Dec. 1. Two deer limit, with restrictions of does.
- Silver gray squirrel open season from July 1 to Nov. 1.
- In the evening, Mr. Finley delivered an instructive lecture at the Natatorium upon the work of the fish and game association, illustrated by photos showing the removal of elks from Jackson Hole, in Yellowstone park, to Wallowa game reserve, and of game birds and water fowls in the Klamath game preserve.

### EXPOSE ROTTENNESS OF SOLDIER'S HOME

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Nov. 22.—Edward L. Grafton, magazine publisher, testified today before the senatorial committee that is probing conditions at the National Soldiers' Home at Sawtelle, citing observations he made during visit to the institution. Grafton declared that some of the food he had seen on tables there was not of the best, and that the beds in the barracks did not appear clean. He further declared that the veterans appeared loath to make complaints.

Charles Hamilton, a Spanish war veteran, testified that he had been treated in the Home hospital, and that he had deemed it necessary to leave to obtain treatment elsewhere. He also commented on the disinclination of the veterans to make complaints, fear of the officials, he declared being the cause.

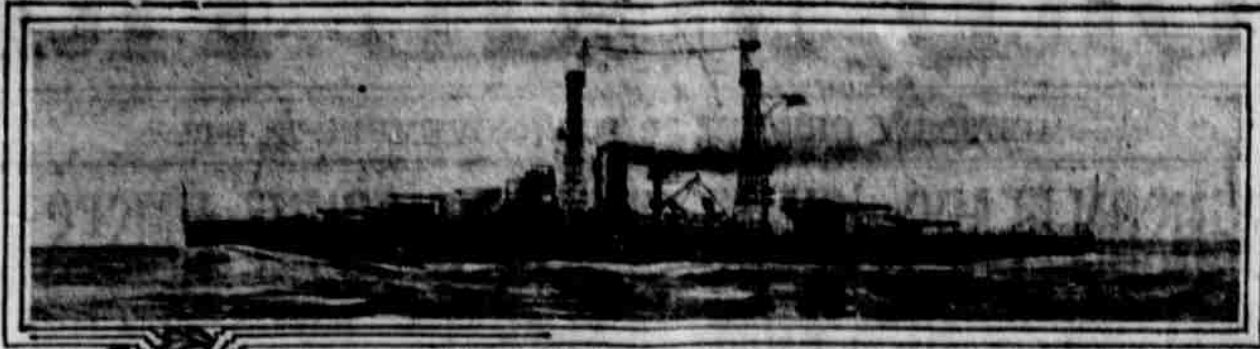
### APPLE BOX WAR MAY END SOON

Western apple-growers probably will be brought in harmony with those of the middle west and east on the subject of a standard box as a result of a resolution adopted by the Horticultural society at Portland Thursday. The fight of years which has defeated the numerous bills introduced in Congress on this subject, is giving way to peaceful adjustments, and the Oregon growers yesterday voted for a measure which is understood to be acceptable throughout the nation with rare exceptions.

C. E. Whisler, of Medford, read a paper on "Standardizing of Grade, Pack and Packages of Apples," which brought out the fact that a harmony movement is on all over the country, to end the apple box war. Conferences have been held, and out of these have grown mutual concessions and proposals, until all interests are apparently a unit on the form of bill presented by Mr. Whisler to the state society. With a minor amendment offered by C. A. Malboeuf, the measure will be adopted by the state society this afternoon, and a committee named to take it up with all other bodies of a similar kind, who are understood to favor the measure.

have been bringing east and west together, as it was reported to the society today, it is provided that "The standard apple box shall be 19 1/2 inches deep, 11 1/2 inches wide and 18 inches long, inside measurement, representing as nearly as possible 217.5 cubic inches. If any other box is used, it must have stamped clearly on it "Short Box." All boxes shall bear the number of apples packed therein, the name of the person, company or association packing, with district where grown. A reasonably uniform size of apples is required to be packed in boxes. A penalty of \$1 a box is provided for any person offering apples for sale not in conformity with the provisions of the act, which is made an amendment to the pure food and drugs act.

### EARTHQUAKE SHAKES BRITISH COLUMBIA

VANCOUVER, B. C., Nov. 22.—Earth tremors of some severity were felt throughout the city yesterday afternoon and for a considerable time thereafter the newspaper offices were besieged with requests for information regarding the unwonted occurrence. As the city does not possess a seismograph the extent and direction of the tremors could be ascertained. They were felt over a considerable area, however, stretching from the banks of the Fraser river to the north arm of Burrard In-

let. In some homes articles fell from the walls and others standing on tables were moved an inch or two. No damage, however, has been recorded.

The first tremor was felt about 4:30 p. m. and the second and more vigorous about 4:45 p. m.
