

M'ALLISTER TAKEN TO MEDFORD JAIL RELEASED ON BOND

E. S. J. McAllister of Portland, one of the leading attorneys of Oregon, for years general counsel for the anti-saloon league, a prominent member of the Popular Government League, and well known as an orator on social and political topics was taken from train 13 Thursday afternoon by Chief of Police Hittson upon a telegraphic request from the district attorney of Multnomah county and locked in the city jail until cash bond for \$1000 had been deposited by his partner at Portland. Mr. McAllister is wanted in connection with the juvenile court inquiry into the Portland vice ring.

Mr. McAllister has been at Coos Bay for the past week, and the scandal broke during his absence. He declares his innocence and alleges that he is the victim of a frame-up and can easily clear himself of the serious charges against him. He declares that he was enroute to Ashland on personal business affair and had no intention of escaping over the state line. He was highly indignant at his arrest, declaring his confinement in the city jail an outrage, and that if given an opportunity, he could arrange ten times the required bail by wire.

Portland officers wired Marshfield for McAllister's arrest. The message was delayed and the officials were notified from Marshfield that McAllister had left on the regular morning boat for the mouth of the Umpqua river, in time to connect with stage for Drain, at which the Southern Pacific is taken.

Mr. McAllister is well known in Medford where he conducted the cases for the anti-saloon league in its attempts to make Medford dry. He has a conspicuous personality, is six feet in height, weighs 275 pounds clean shaven, wears glasses, and was wearing a vivid green suit. He was implicated by the confessions of several boys made to the juvenile court and is accused of unprintable crimes.

Mr. McAllister left on the Shasta Limited for Portland Friday morning.

SCHRANK INSANE DECLARE MEN WHO EXAMINED HIM

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Nov. 22.—Alienists who examined John Schrank, the assassin who attempted the life of Colonel Roosevelt, officially declared the prisoner insane here today.

Judge August Backus of the municipal court committed Schrank to the state hospital for criminal insane at Oshkosh. The prisoner will be taken to the asylum tomorrow.

The report of the alienists said: "We find: First, John Schrank is suffering from insane delusions, grandiose in character, and of the systematized variety; second, in our opinion, he is insane at the present time; third, on account of close relations between his delusions and the acts with which he stands charged, we believe him unable to confer intelligently with counsel or to conduct his defense.
