

### MRS. A. B. SCHUSTER IS MEMBER BOARD OF REGISTRATION

The city dads Friday night officially recognized the women of Medford, granted the franchise at the recent city election, by the appointment of Mrs. A. B. Schuster to the city registration board which will sit for 10 days next month to register voters for the coming city election. A delegation of suffrage workers requested the council to appoint a woman to the board and at their suggestion Mrs. Schuster was appointed.

In the appointment of Mrs. Schuster the Medford city dads were the first men in Oregon to officially recognize the women of the state following the granting of equal suffrage and Mrs. Schuster is the first woman to be so recognized. She was an earnest worker for the cause during the recent campaign and is well fitted for the place.

The registration board is composed of Mrs. Schuster, Clinton Texer and James Stewart. The mayor was given power to employ such extra clerks as may be needed. With the number of voters increased by the granting of suffrage to women the one board provided by the charter will be kept extremely busy. It will meet 10 days from 1 to 7 p. m. at the city hall commencing December 14.

### DRAMATIC ARTIST HERE THIS WEEK

Mme. Harriet Labadie, the noted dramatic artist, who is now on a second visit to the coast to fill a number of return engagements, has been engaged by the Greater Medford Club to give a dramatic interpretation of Percy MacKaye's play, "Tomorrow," on November 28, at the Natatorium.

Mme. Labadie is making the longest tour of consecutive seasons, embracing the most extensive itinerary of the American continent ever undertaken by a dramatic interpreter. Particularly interesting is the fact that during her tour of Alaska in the summer of 1910, when the artist appeared in all the ports of call as far north as Nome, to which point she traveled 2193 miles by boat down the Yukon, a trip that carries the voyager across the Arctic circle. Mme. Labadie gave interpretations of Ibsen's "A Doll House" and "The Servant in the House" by Rann Kennedy, both plays being received with an appreciation that exceeded her highest hopes. The trip back to the east was made with many return engagements through the west by way of the middle west states from Winnipeg to San Antonio, Texas, and from Florida up through the cities of the southwest coast states to New York.

In August, 1910, Mme. Labadie visited the maritime provinces of Canada, and appeared in St. John, New Brunswick, exactly one year and a day after her appearance in Nome, Alaska, having thus half circled the continent.

Apart from the interest attached to her unique tour, Mme. Labadie's engagement in this city promises to be a rare treat for all lovers of the highest dramatic art.

### O. A. C. BAND WILL PLAY HERE DEC. 27

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, CORVALLIS, Ore., Nov. 23.—A schedule of a dozen concerts, besides the approaching home concert, has been announced by the director of the end of military band of the Oregon Agricultural College.

Capt. Harry Beard has arranged for the boys to visit ten cities of western Oregon during the Christmas vacation. Leaving the campus on Christmas eve, they will go first to Cottage Grove, where they will play both afternoon and evening on Christmas day in the moving picture theatre. The next day they go to Grants Pass where they will give a concert under the auspices of the high school. There, as in Medford, and in other cities, they hope to assist the high school boys in organizing their band.

On Friday, December 27, they will play in Medford, and will return to Medford for a second concert Sunday afternoon.

### CITY ATTORNEY SAYS CAMPBELL AND FOSS HOLD ON

Unless a mandamus suit, hinted at by Councilman Millar of the Third Ward, materializes, the offices of city recorder and councilman in the second ward, will not be open to argument at the next city election. In an opinion read before the council Friday night City Attorney Neff states that according to the charter men appointed to office fill the terms the men whose places they took were elected for.

City Recorder Foss was appointed last spring to fill the place of Robert W. Teifer, resigned. Mr. Teifer had been elected for a two year term which ends in January, 1914. Councilman Campbell was appointed to fill the office to which E. C. Ireland was elected under similar conditions. The contention was that these men could only serve until the next general election.

The socialists may begin mandamus proceedings to force the election of officials to those places.

### MAYOR CANON AND MITCHELL JANGLE

Mayor Canon and Would-be-mayor Mitchell mixed at the meeting of the city council Friday evening and for a time the war clouds settled threateningly over the council chamber, finally clearing when City Recorder Foss stepped into the breach by beginning diplomatically to read a sewer resolution.

The trouble arose over a petition for paving, which Mitchell charged had been sidetracked by the mayor. Thereupon Mayor Canon declared that it had not been sidetracked and that action could be had at any time.

Mayor Canon at the close of the jangle took occasion to remark that he had no interest in any paving matters in the town and that he wanted to hear no insinuations to that effect. Thereupon the city recorder began to read.
