TWELVE MEMBERS FAMILY SLAIN

KAMLOOPS, B. C., Nov. 25.—Twelve relatives murdered in Mexico, including father, mother, three brothers and three sisters, is the horrifying intelligence conveyed in a telegram this morning to Miss Gertrude Hoek, a milliner of this city.

The massacre was perpetrated by Mexican rebels and occurred October 13 on the ranch occupied by Mr. Hoek at Ploasant Valley, a short distance from Mexico City. He was an American citizen and the authorities have been trying to locate the daughter for a month. The young woman is prostrated at the terrible news.

Prosecutor Miller started the defendants attorneys by turning over the witness for cross examination. This move caught the defendant's attorneys off guard. Senator Kern asked for a postponement but Miller objected and Judge Anderson ordered the cross examination to go on. Ortle then admitted to pleading guilty to a grand larceny charge in Chicago.

Judge Anderson this afternoon fixed H. S. Hoekin's bond at \$15,000 but declined to increase the bonds of the other defendants at the request of Prosecutor Miller.

Bail Not Raised

Attorneys for the defense denounced the article by Mary Fields in the Bridgeman's Magazine and which Judge Anderson declared was in contempt of court. The defendants, the attorneys said, had no connection with the article and were not in sympathy with it.

So far Mrs. Hoekin has been unable to raise the \$10,000 additional bond required for her husband, H. S. Hoekin, secretary-treasurer of the Ironworkers' international organization who was ordered into custody by Judge Anderson because the evidence so far adduced "showed Hoekin was not to be trusted."

DR. ANNA SHAW AGAIN SUFFRAGIST CHIEF

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 25.—Dr. Anna Howard Shaw, this afternoon was overwhelming re-elected president of the National Suffrage association. The insurgent candidate, Laura Clay, of Kentucky, only got twenty votes. On early ballots Katherine McCullough received 13 votes and Jane Addams 11, but their names did not appear on the deciding ballot, their votes reverting to Dr. Shaw.

are either massed on their frontiers or are in easy striking distance and if Serbia and Austria, the storm centers of the embroglio, really come to blows, it is a certainty that within a few hours practically all of central Europe will be at war.

Dispatches from Semlin, Hungary, this evening report that a rumor is current in Austrian circles that Russia has suggested that she join the Balkan alliance after peace is arranged and it is reported also that England probably will sanction such a federation as tending to check German and Slavic expansion in the near east.

Peace Proposals

Sofia dispatches say that the Bulgarian cabinet is considering Turkey's peace proposals. No indication is given as to what the response will be. The impression in London, however, is that the real danger in the near east is no longer dependent on Turkey's action, that the Sultan has ceased to be a factor and that on the Servian-Austrian outcrops hangs the future of the continent.

GENEVA, Switzerland, Nov. 25.—France today ordered her army reservists to be in readiness to join the colors on short notice. All the railroads of France have been directed to assemble cars at strategic points.

BERLIN, Nov. 25.—It is reported that here today Germany is mobilizing two army corps on the Russian frontiers. Depositors, fearing hostilities, are drawing money from the banks.

BERLIN, Nov. 25.—Vague rumors here that hostilities between Austria and Servia had begun caused a heavy slump in the market. The origin of the rumors has not yet been learned.

Peace In Sight

BERLIN, Nov. 25.—All indications here today pointed to a settlement of all difficulties arising from the Balkan dispute without a general European war.

Although military preparations continue unabated, Austria is in a conciliatory mood, and semi-official notes indicate the danger of war is decreasing. While Germany has promised Austria its support in the event of a clash with Russia, Kaiser Wilhelm has emphasized the hope that war will be averted.

France and England, it is reported here, also have convinced the Russian czar that it is unnecessary to throw all Europe into the greatest war in history.

Contradictory reports

PARIS, Nov. 25.—Although the international situation resulting from the struggle in the Balkan states is regarded here today as improved, there is little indication of a settlement.

It is reported that Russia, Austria, Germany and Italy have nearly 2,500,000 troops mobilized, and that their navies are ready for any eventuality.

BELGRADE, Nov. 25.—King Peter presided over a cabinet council here today, after which the government notified Austria that Servia cannot definitely outline her attitude until the end of the Balkan war.

The action was decided upon owing to the fact that the last two days of this week are holidays and that a proper fumigation of the building would require a week's time.

None of the other schools in the city are effected.

HEAVINESS FEATURE OF STOCK MARKET

NEW YORK, Nov. 25.—Owing to the publication of the award announced by the arbitration board to engineers demands since Saturday's close Wall Street was greatly interested in the opening of the stock market here today. Heaviness was a marked feature and the largest losses were in railroads. Declines of more than a point were recorded in Lehigh Valley, Southern Pacific, Northern Pacific, Great Northern preferred and Norfolk and Western. Canadian Pacific dropped 1 3/8 points.

After moderate recoveries stocks dropped abruptly upon receipt of an unconfirmed report that hostilities had been opened between Austria and Servia.
