

ROGUE RIVER FARES WELL AT PRODUCTS SHOW AT PORTLAND

The Rogue River valley fared very well at the Northwest Land Products Show held at Portland last week. The Ashland commercial club, with its very creditable display of general soil products, captured three prizes—first for the best district display, the L. W. Hill cup for the best agricultural and horticultural products and the Southern Pacific cup for the best exhibition made by a district or county on the line of that road.

Ashland exploited the entire Rogue river valley. While fruit occupied a prominent place in the booth, much attention was given to corn, which is destined soon to become one of Oregon's principal products. More than 300 separate soil products were represented, including all kinds of grain, grasses, vegetables and fruits, fresh, canned and processed.

CALIFORNIA SHIPS ITS LAST PEARS

SACRAMENTO, Nov. 25.—The following gives number of cars of deciduous fruit shipped from all points in California for the week (7 days) ending Friday evening, November 22, 1912.

Pears—Five cars. There are no more pears to be shipped during the season of 1912, and we do not believe there are any more left in the state, although it is possible that there still may be a few.

Grapes—Seventy-five cars. Shipment of grapes has kept up better than expected during the past week.

We are now rapidly nearing the end, however, and next week will certainly mark the close of the season. Exporters have been of unusually good quality and have been meeting with a splendid demand at fine prices.

RIVERS AND MANDOT IN FINE CONDITION

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Nov. 25.—Six thousand boxing enthusiasts are garrulous today with tales of the marvelous condition into which Joe Mandot and Joe Rivers have worked themselves for their Thanksgiving Day match at Vernon. Four thousand rabid bugs watched Mandot work out at Doyle's yesterday and 2000 criticised Rivers at the Vernon pavilion. Both men appeared in satisfactory shape.

For the first time in two weeks Rivers used the gloves yesterday. He went three rounds with fast little Eddie Campi, outboxing the San Francisco bantam, and then plugged seven rounds with heavier opponents. The cut over his eye has almost healed.

Mandot exhibited the same dazzling speed that characterized his first Rivers fight. If anything, his hitting power has increased. He made a distinctly favorable impression.

PLAN TO OPERATE GOLD DREDGE ON BAR AT GOLD HILL

Arrangements have been practically completed for a new and bigger departure in mining operations on the Rogue river near Gold Hill, the site selected being the big bar just below the Lyman ranch, and the method of recovery to be a huge dredge, designed and built expressly for the purpose by the Southern capitalists who are interested in the venture. These men are J. K. Moore, H. M. McLean and C. F. Reynolds, all of whom have had wide practical experience in dredging operations, and who will invest from \$50,000 to \$100,000 in the construction of the dredge and preparations for the work.

Mr. Reynolds, representing the trio, was in Gold Hill for several days the first part of the week making a final survey of the project and conferring with Henry Ray, who has been largely instrumental in directing interest toward one of the most neglected and undoubtedly profitable systems of mining in southern Oregon. He is now in Oroville, California, at which point some fifty or sixty dredges of varying types are engaged in operations upon the rich sand bars of that river, and where he intends to make a final determination of the type of dredge which will be constructed for work on the Rogue.

RIGHT OF WAY FOR NATRON CUT-OFF

With the closing of a deal by the Southern Pacific for 20 miles of right of way through the Hunter Land company's holdings in Southern Oregon, the last foot of ground for that purpose between Eugene and Klamath Falls has been secured for the Natron-Weed cut-off.

The right of way just secured extends on a part of the old Oregon Military road grant from Odell lake to the northern boundary of the Klamath Indian Reservation. This section of the land grant was taken over last year by the Hunter Land company, in which Portland and St. Paul capitalists are interested. One of the terms of the deal stipulates that the railroad company shall set aside five station grounds, comprising an area of 300x400 feet each. The five stations to be provided for along this right of way will bear the names of Lenothe, Rogers, Carroll, Troutbridge and Whitfield.

The Hunter Land company is building an irrigation project which will water 20,000 acres. The water supply is to be secured from Fish lake.

The Natron cut-off between Eugene and Klamath Falls is now about one-half completed.

GENERAL OROZCO TO BE ARRESTED TODAY

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Nov. 25.—Deputy United States Marshal Dingle, refused today to deny that General Pascual Orozco, Mexican revolutionary leader, is in Los Angeles, and will be arrested today. "I have nothing to say at this time," Dingle said. "There is nothing definite I can say."

Asked how soon something definite might develop, Dingle replied: "Very possibly within an hour or two."

Orozco is generally reported to be living here close to his family, which has been in Los Angeles several weeks.

MOVE MILLION DOLLAR SUGAR FACTORY TO UTAH

NAMPA, Idaho, Nov. 25.—Workmen are busy today preparing for the demolition of the million dollar sugar factory of E. H. Dyer and company, said to be the largest in the state. The plant is being moved to Spanish Fork, Utah, where the structural steel will be transferred.

The mill has been closed for the past three years.

The "Korinek Veterinary Remedy company" is incorporated under the laws of Oregon. Is president, Dr. Chas. J. PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 25.—That the portfolio of secretary of state will be offered to William Jennings Bryan and that Wilson will make good as president is today the opinion of ex-Chairman Norman E. Mack of the democratic national committee, who visited here with the New York delegation to select empire state fair site in San Francisco. Mack is chairman of the delegation. "No distress is being observed in business circles as a result of the democratic victory," he declared. "The people generally have great confidence in Wilson, and we are now too far advanced to harbor the idea that a democratic administration and a business depression go hand in hand."

MAJORITY 12,772 FOR RATE BILL

SALFEM, Ore., Nov. 25.—Complete official returns on the measures submitted to the people at the recent election show that the income tax amendment was lost by the narrow margin of 246 votes. Woman suffrage carried by 4161 votes, and the university millage bill fell by the wayside under 5578 votes. The biggest majority was piled up against the bill creating the office of hotel inspector, the majority against it being 75,985. The vote on the last eight measures on the ballot has not yet been totaled, but the official returns on all other measures are as follows:
