rights of man, in the following language: "Good people, things will never be well in England, so long as goods be not in common, and so long as there be villeins and gentlemen. By what right are they whom we eall lords greater folk than we? On what grounds have they deserved it? Why do they hold us in serfage? If we all come of the same father and mother, of Adam and Eve, how can they say or prove that they are better than we, if it be not that they make us gain for them by our toil what they spend in their pride? They are cloaked in velvet and warm in their furs and their ermines, while we are covered with rags. They have wine, and spices and fair bread; and we oatcake and straw and water to drink. They have leisure and fine houses; we have pain and labor, the rain and the wind in the fields. And yet it is of us and our toil that these men hold their state.

The peasants' revolt culminated in Wat Tyler's rebellion followed by wholesale executions. Seven thousand men were hanged in one summer for uttering the treasonable doctrine of equality of mankind. Yet the old conditions died away in spite of laws and courts and armies, and serfdom was abolished.
