COMMUNICATION. Mr. Gates Replies.

To the Editor: Replying to Mr. Drumbill's article concerning my platform, I am pleased to know that so far as it goes, it meets with his approval.

His article has some very good suggestions, but there are others that would admit of considerable argument. Taking his suggestions in the order named.

First salaries. It is generally conceded throughout this great land of ours that every man's time should be worth something and there are very few, if any, places in this country where he devotes his time to any cause without some remuneration.

Nevertheless I have not entered into this race with any idea of remuneration and if at the next election the people deem it proper to vote to abolish all salaries of public officials, it will be perfectly satisfactory to me.

PROSECUTING THE "APPEAL."

EUGENE DEBS and Fred D. Warren of the "Appeal Reason" have been indicted again by a federal grand jury, this time charged with tampering with a witness.

The real crime these men are guilty of is running a socialist newspaper that courageously attacks the existing order and the recipients of special privilege.

There are a good many articles in the Appeal to Reason that seem indefensible appeals to class prejudice—but they may be necessary to awaken the class they are striving to reach.

On the whole, the influence of the Appeal to Reason is for good, and it is because it tells the truth, along with its buncomb, that its editors are persecuted by the federal government, whose agents it has exposed.

This paper does not believe that the communistic state, advocated by socialists, is either practical or a cure-all for social and political evils. But this is a problem that the evolution of the race will work out.

It has been the function of the federal government, as of all governments of the past, to protect the classes rather than the masses, to protect the dollar rather than the man. It is the protest against these conditions that the Appeal voices.

Perhaps the first "appeal to reason" the English speaking race listened to was in the glorious reign of Edward III. in the fourteenth century. Edward, drunk from his conquest of the French, was unable to conquer the misery existing in merry England.

John Ball, the "Mad Priest of Kent," mad even as Debs is mad, because he opposed existing inequality, made the first appeal to reason, the first declaration of the rights of man, in the following language:

"Good people, things will never be well in England, so long as goods be not in common, and so long as there be villains and gentlemen. By what right are they whom we call lords greater folk than we?"

The peasants' revolt culminated in Wat Tyler's rebellion followed by wholesale executions. Seven thousand men were hanged in one summer for uttering the treasonable doctrine of equality of mankind.

It was the tyranny of property that called forth John Ball's appeal, just as it has called forth the "Appeal to Reason" of the 20th century.

The remedy is not the punishment and persecution of the Balls, Debs' and Warrens, but the remedying of conditions that create them—remove the cause and not the result.

SEATTLE JARRED BY EARTHQUAKE

SEATTLE, Nov. 25.—"Do you think there will be another?" is the question on everybody's tongue here today as the result of three earthquake shocks which jarred this city at intervals of an hour last night.

"Very ladylike little tremors," was the statement of the students who observed the records made by the seismograph at Washington university. There was none of the upheaving motion felt in destructive shocks, but just a gentle shaking strong enough to make everybody in town take notice.
