Servia Recalls Troops

BERLIN, Nov. 27.—It is reported here today that Servia has recalled practically all her troops from Turkey to resist an expected Austrian invasion. If the news is true this action will seriously affect Bulgaria and probably will force Czar Ferdinand to accept the Sultan's terms of peace. The general situation today is regarded as distinctly favorable to Turkey.

Arbitration Refused

BERLIN, Nov. 27.—Austria today declined Germany's suggestion to submit the Austro-Servian dispute to an international tribunal.

ROME, Nov. 27.—The Messagro today quotes the Russian ambassador here as saying that the Czar will support Servia's demand for an Adriatic port against all opposition. The ambassador, however, believes that war will be averted, probably by a conference of the powers.

PARIS, Nov. 27.—A dispatch to the Matin from Vienna today quotes Foreign Minister Berchtold of Austria as saying that war is inevitable if Servia rejects the Austrian-Balkan proposals.

FRANKFORT ON THE MAIN, Germany, Nov. 27.—Orders to report to their regiments have been received here today by Austro-Hungarian subjects, members of the army reserve corps. Funds with which to pay their fare to the Austrian frontier also accompanied the order. Similar orders were received by Hun-

Germany Prepared

BERLIN, Nov. 27.—Declaration that Germany already has provided against the possibility of war was made here today by the Vorwaerts, a socialist newspaper. The \$40,000,000 entered in the new budget for the general finance administration, the newspaper says, "is really intended to pay for the enormous reserves" clothing and provisions for men and beasts which the army and navy has accumulated against the possible outbreak of war.

The Vorwaerts says it reached its conclusion from what is already known of the current budget, pointing out that the increase in army and navy expenditures over that stated by the government is \$31,400,000.
