

### PICATO CLEVEREST IN RECENT YEARS

With all the great championship battles of Thanksgiving day over, local boxing fans will now turn their attention over to the home match. Bud Anderson and "Babe" Picato, who are scheduled to box ten rounds for the lightweight championship of the northwest on December 4th before the Medford Athletic club.

Although Picato is not yet out of his "teens" he is considered by famous sporting writers, to be the fastest and cleverest boxer produced in late years. Picato has only been in the ring three years, boxed his first year as an amateur, then branched out into the professional ranks and has yet to meet his first defeat in the boxing game.

Picato comes from a fighting family, he being the youngest of three brothers, the other two being Charley and Frank the latter a few years ago was considered a top notch lightweight and has had three ten round no decision bouts with champion Ad Wogast. Charley another brother is now boxing with fair success around Los Angeles, but "Babe" is the star of the family. Boxing seems to have been hereditary with him, as in the ring he goes on about his business like a past master at the game.

In meeting Anderson, Picato realizes that the Vancouver whirlwind is a hard nut to crack but "Babe" says, "they all look alike to him."

### IDENTIFY VOGEL AS SAM V. DAVIDDOR

MILWAUKEE, Nov. 28.—That Joseph Vogel, master of a small army of thieving foreign working girls, who was shot to death in the Elsmere Hotel in The Bronx, New York, and Sam V. Daviddor, ex-Milwaukee clubman, stock and mining promoter and man about town, were one, is the opinion of police officials here.

If the deductions of the police department are right it will reveal the first information as to the identity of the man, who, the New York police say, directed more than 1000 robberies in that city.

Daviddor was a big mining, oil and stock promoter in Milwaukee until he was indicted by the grand jury for illegal use of the mails.

Daviddor also went to Portland,

Or., where he was the chief promoter of the Washington Home Telephone company. A few months later the concern collapsed and Daviddor disappeared for about one year. At the same time, he was interested in several mining deals, posing as a promoter of mining properties of fabulous wealth.

Daviddor was next heard from in Portland in November, 1909, when he was indicted by the Federal authorities for alleged misuse of the mails to defraud investors in connection with the management of the Pacific Northwest Realty Associates.

Daviddor was well known in Medford having visited here several times. He claimed to be seeking investments and was entertained by local real estate men. In appearance, he was a French dandy and a lavish spender.

### RIVERS VICTORIOUS OVER MANDOT

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 29.—After twenty rounds of hard fighting at "Uncle Tom" McCarrey's Vernon arena yesterday afternoon, Mexican Joe Rivers, was awarded the decision over Joe Mandot of Memphis, Tenn.

Mandot, the "Fighting Frenchman" led all the way to the eighth round, when his speed left him and he was unable to keep away from the Mexican's fierce onslaughts and only his extreme cleverness enabled him to stay the twenty rounds. In the final round, Mandot made a wonderful burst of speed and was fighting wildly when the gong sounded, but Referee Charley Eytton raised the right hand glove of Rivers' in token of victory.
