Poland Pleads Not Guilty

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Dec. 4.—Wallace I. Poland, former cashier of the International Harvester company of America, who is under indictment on two counts of forgery and embezzlement in connection with short-ages found in his accounts, appeared before Superior Judge Dunne today and pleaded not guilty.

The case was then continued until December 11 to be set for trial. Poland is being held at the county jail in default of \$10,000 bail.
