CHICAGO, Ill.—(Back to the Land Bureau).—Kindly give me any available information regarding the land in the vicinity of Medford, Ore.

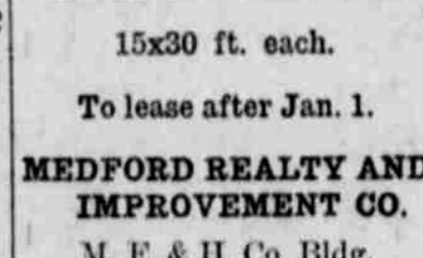
