MYSTERY SURROUNDS CASE OF WOMAN WHO DIED WHILE COOKING THANKSGIVING DINNER

Miss Octavia Frederick, of Brooklyn, N. Y., well beyond seventy years old and reputed to be worth more than a million dollars, was found dead in her dining room over a barber shop at No. 24 Hoyt street on Thanksgiving Day. It was at first believed that she died from suffocation following a fire caused by an overturned stove which she was using to cook her Thanksgiving dinner. Now, however, a mystery surrounds the case, as Anthony Orelicke, an Italian, who occupied the room below hers, has displayed a will in which the dead woman leaves all her property to him.

FRUSTRATE ATTEMPT AT JAIL DELIVERY

TACOMA, Wash., Dec. 3.—An attempt to saw his way out of the county jail on the part of E. Salyards, a prisoner charged with embezzlement, has been discovered by Jailor James Longmire. That a general jail delivery was to have followed his completion of the job is the belief of the sheriff's office.

Last Friday night Jailor Longmire says he overheard a conversation between Salyards and another prisoner which led him to investigate. Hiding in the woodpile back of the jail he says he saw Salyards cut an eighteen inch hole in the screen over one of the jail windows, raise the sash, and work an hour sawing with a knife made into a saw and highly tempered, on one of the outside bars.

Salyards has been placed in solitary confinement today. He had two other prisoners stand guard while he worked.

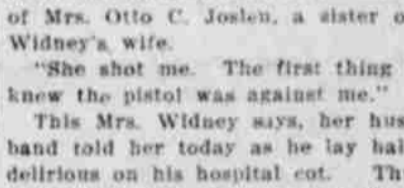

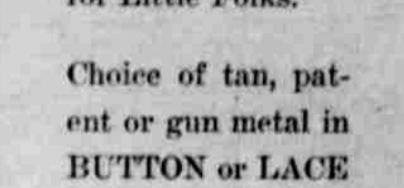
