

PRESIDENT WILSON WILL BE INVITED TO VISIT CRATER

"Honorable Woodrow Wilson
President of the United States
Washington, D. C.
Dear Sir: The Medford Commercial club is advised that you intend to visit the state of Oregon sometime in June, 1913, and it hereby extends to you and your party a cordial invitation to include Medford in your itinerary; and as our guest visit the famous Crater Lake, one of the scenic wonders of the western world. Our people will be delighted to accord you a royal entertainment on that occasion.

The above is a copy of a letter authorized by the Medford Commercial club Wednesday evening to be sent to Senators Chamberlain and Lane for presentation to President Wilson after his inauguration.

The authorization of the letter inviting President Wilson to visit Crater Lake followed the reading of a communication from Will G. Steel, stating that President-elect Woodrow Wilson would be in Portland same time in June, 1913, and that he had already communicated with Senator Chamberlain asking the president to visit Crater Lake while on his western trip.

MOTHERS' PENSIONS FAVORED BY CLUB

At the Commercial club meeting Wednesday evening a communication was read from the Oregon Congress of Mothers, in reference to the dependent widows pension bill, a measure that is to be introduced in the forthcoming session of the Oregon legislature. A copy of the bill, consisting of eleven sections was read to the club, and in the discussion which followed it seemed to be the opinion that this proposed law is something new, there being only three states of the Union that have similar laws; and the members not being advised that the bill offered is the best under the circumstances, considered it advisable not to recommend the bill as drafted. But on motion the club placed itself on record as favoring the objects to be attained by such a law, leaving the provisions of the law to be regulated and fixed by the members of the legislature. The president was instructed to prepare such a letter as would convey to the promoters of the measure the sentiments of the club in reference thereto, and as herein indicated.

BARONESS SEEKS TO RECOVER \$20,260



Mystery surrounds the action of the Baroness de Pallandt against Charles B. Flynn, a wealthy mining engineer, with the McIntyre Porcupine Mines, in Canada. The judgment obtained against Mr. Flynn is for \$20,260, which the Baroness declares she advanced to the mining man in Paris in 1903 and for which he gave his note. The Baroness de Pallandt is of a wealthy Chicago family and was Miss May Dugas before she was married, in 1893. She was separated from her husband in 1901 and met Mr. Flynn in Paris in 1903, where he was busy promoting some mining properties. Friends of the Baroness have said that the mining man was attentive to her at this time that the two became good friends and she advanced \$20,260 to be invested in the Canadian mining properties. The Baroness de Pallandt has figured in the news before. In 1902 John D. Kipatrik killed himself. Mr. Kipatrik was a wealthy young man, and, according to his friends, he fell in love with the Baroness, who had been separated from her husband at that time. She suddenly left for Europe when he was pressing his suit, and he was found dead in the Martinique Hotel soon afterward.

TEAL IS ENDORSED FOR SECRETARYSHIP

The president of the Medford Commercial club Wednesday evening was instructed to prepare and forward a suitable endorsement of the candidacy of J. N. Teal of Portland for the position of secretary of the interior under the forthcoming democratic administration. Commercial organizations throughout the northwest have taken similar action.

LAWYER'S ADVICE RYAN'S SHIELD; DENIES KNOWLEDGE

INDIANAPOLIS, Dec. 5.—Frank M. Ryan, indicted president of the Ironworkers' union, testified at the dynamite trial today that after the arrest of the McNamara he, on the advice of counsel, resisted the removal of evidence wanted at Los Angeles, where the McNamara were charged with murder. The papers referred to were afterward secured by the government in connection with the indictments of the men now on trial.

The witness named Leo Rapport as the attorney who took charge of the union's affairs. Rapport had testified that after interviewing J. J. McNamara at Los Angeles he returned to Indianapolis and destroyed a small check book. That check book, the government charges, contained disbursements by McNamara for the expenses of the dynamiting crew. Ryan said he knew nothing of Rapport's act, in fact, never heard that McNamara was drawing \$1000 from the union for which no accounting was given until the night of McNamara's arrest.

FIVE TO PLEAD THIS AFTERNOON

Five men will appear in the circuit court this afternoon to plead to indictments found against them by the grand jury. The men are Mike Spanos, Frank Seymour, Philip Martin, Frank Doyle and Joe Travis.

Mike Spanos and Frank Seymour will plead to indictments charging them with first degree murder and Phil Martin, Frank Doyle and Joe Travis to indictments for burglary.

T. A. Le Masters, charged with polygamy, in having two wives, one in Medford and the other in Eugene, was indicted by the grand jury Wednesday. Evidence was introduced against Le Masters, including a number of letters written by a woman in Klamath Falls and another in Redding, Cal.

F. W. Burke, a farmer living near Talent, charged with a statutory offense against a 17-year-old girl, whose guardian he was made after the death of her mother, was indicted.

WESTON APPOINTED CLUB PHOTOGRAPHER

At a meeting of the Medford Commercial club Wednesday evening E. D. Weston of this city was appointed official photographer for that organization. The following resolution was adopted in this connection: "Whereas, E. D. Weston, a resident of the city of Medford, a member of the Medford Commercial club, and one of the best photographers on the Pacific coast, is desirous of being recognized as the official photographer of the club; and so to act without salary or other compensation; he agreeing to furnish the club with such photographs, views of orchards, etc., as he may from time to time have in stock, and to do any other work for the club that may be done without any considerable expense to himself. Therefore, he it resolved, that E. D. Weston be, and hereby is appointed the official photographer of the Medford Commercial club."

EVANGELIST PARSONS HEARD BY MANY

CONSTITUTION OF CLUB AMENDED

A number of changes in the constitution of the Medford Commercial club were made Wednesday evening. One is an amendment to section 2, fixing the time of the regular meetings; and it appearing that the fire company of Medford, have always had the first Wednesday in the month as a time for their meeting, it seems necessary to change the regular meeting of the club, and the provision provides for one regular meeting in each month and time therefore was fixed for the second Wednesday of the month, and special meetings at any time as already provided. It was also decided that section 1 of article IX be amended so that any person desiring to become a member shall only be required to pay in advance the sum of \$1.00, eliminating the admission fee of \$5.00. And that section 2 of article IX be repealed. Said section 2 as it now stands is more appropriate for a social club, it requiring that each applicant shall sign a written application, which shall be indorsed by some member of the club in good standing. The president stated that this section is of no use whatsoever, and hence the proposition to repeal it.

There was no report of the committee which was appointed November 13th, for the purpose of arranging a public meeting of the club.
