OREGON MOTHERS PROPOSE REFORMS

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 5.—According to Mrs. F. Eggert, president of the Portland Women's club, and many other prominent woman leaders, the women of the state are to endeavor by personal appeal to the legislature to secure the passage of the widow's pension and pure cloth bills, a measure compelling physical examination for applicants for marriage licenses, a bill for the creation of a state board of charities and corrections and other measures.

The bill proposed by the Oregon Congress of Mothers providing for the amelioration of the condition of women whose husbands are in state institutions or dead, and who have little or no means of support, will be made a leading lobby issue.

Nearly a score of humanitarian issues will be presented to the legislators by the women of the state.

INSURANCE TRUSTEES IN ANNUAL SESSION

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—Company presidents and other trustees of policyholders representing more than seventy-five per cent of the eighteen billion dollars of old line life insurance now in force in this country, are here attending the sixth annual convention of the Association of Life Insurance Presidents, which began this morning. Betterment of life insurance service, which is the dominating note of the convention, is being discussed.

In advocating the adoption of a system for financing farm credits in this country along the general line of those abroad, Ambassador Herick suggested the embodiment of a life insurance plan to cover the loan in case of the death of the borrower. The Ambassador stated that the subject of agricultural credits is not intricate but that it is simply an application of the story of the bundle of sticks tied together—single, easily broken; together, able to withstand any pressure.

SCHOOL GIRL CANDIDATE TO RUN FOR SENATE

Lafferty, who considers his election to congress in the face of very stiff opposition, as a sort of personal triumph and vindication, would like to go to the United States senate.

Lafferty really believes, it is said, that he would sweep the state and go in by a vote proportionally as large as he received for representative in the recent election. He counts on the Portland vote to overcome any decided opposition in the rural districts.

SUFFRAGETTES SENT TO JAIL FOR RIOTING

LONDON, Dec. 5.—Three suffragettes, charged with having disturbed the chancellor of the exchequer's meeting at Aberdeen, were today fined \$5 or five days in jail. The women refused to either pay the fine or leave the dock, and the police officers were compelled to encircle their protesting arms around the slim waists of the "females of the species" and stroll prisonward with them.

Friends of the bride declared she had been offered \$50,000 to agree to an annulment of the marriage.

FIRST FEMALE JURY DISAGREE

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 5.—All Portland is today discussing the experiences of the society women's jury in Judge Taxwell's police court, which disagreed five to five, in the case of Marcelle Routelle, alleged keeper of a disorderly house.

Those on the jury were Mrs. W. T. Pahle, Mrs. L. W. Therkelsen, Miss Leone Cass Haer, Mrs. A. C. Newill, Mrs. Henry Waldo Coe, Mrs. Paul C. Bates, Mrs. O. C. Bortsmeyer, Mrs. A. E. Clark, Mrs. Laura F. Vinson and Miss Ida M. Jayser. Deputy City Attorney Sullivan conducted the prosecution and Attorney W. M. Davis the defense.

The jury was out one hour and forty minutes, and while in session twice called Judge Taxwell into consultation to iron out some legal wrinkles.

While the real jury was deliberating the women in the courtroom resolved themselves into a larger panel, and a straw vote resulted in twenty-five for acquittal and twenty-three for conviction.

Due to its contention that the prosecution did not establish the fact that the defendant actually conducted the disorderly house, the defense rested without the introduction of witnesses.
