

ANDERSON IS LEADER BY MILE FOR 10 ROUNDS

Mr. Bear Cat Babe Picato, heralded as the man who beat the noted Mr. Red Watson at Oakland a few weeks ago, was tamed considerably in ten rounds of boxing before the Medford Athletic club Friday night by Bud Anderson, the northwest lightweight champion and "pride of Medford." Incidentally Mr. Anderson proved himself an adept at the stand up and box game for he outpointed, out-boxed, outpunched and outgeneraled the clever Picato from tap to tap for 10 rounds. By agreement the bout was called a draw but no fight fan present was so partisan in his views as to dispute the real outcome of the contest. The real situation is summed up by Rawhide Kelly, Picato's manager:

"Give me Anderson three months and I'll make him lightweight champion. He is a marvel." Bud forever has silenced the local fans criticism that he could not box. There are those who have claimed that he was only good at roughing it, winning by his ability to assimilate and pass out punishment. These have said that a clever boxer could "stay away" and outpoint him. They have been silenced. On Friday night, Anderson showed for the first time what he could do at long range where points are at a premium. Pitted against Picato who is heralded as one of the best and cleverest of the second rate boys in the southland, Bud showed vast superiority. He was quick, sure, and at all times master.

Babe Picato has proved himself a splendid loser and has nothing but praise for the local boy. He was not exactly himself owing to the return of indictments by the grand jury Friday and did not come up to what he has previously shown himself to be capable of. He is a clean boy and a gentleman well liked by local fans.

The attendance in spite of grand jury indictments was splendid men from all walks of life being present, showing that Medford likes the game which has always been clean and first class in this city.

Young McClellan and Freddie Anderson went four rounds to a draw but Anderson had a big lead all the way.

Manager Edwards of the Athletic club is to be congratulated on going ahead with the bout and putting on a show as clean and as entertaining as the one Friday night.

ELKS TO ERECT \$75,000 HOME

MRS. SWENNING IS INDICTED; CHARGE RECORD MUTILATION

An indictment was returned by the grand jury Friday against Mrs. Olive Swenning for the mutilation of county records. A warrant has been issued for her arrest and placed in the hands of Deputy Sheriff Shearer for service, with bond fixed at \$200.

According to the officials, Mrs. Swenning induced County Clerk Coleman to allow her to have the court records of her divorce case, and when she returned them a portion had been destroyed and a portion changed.

Mrs. Swenning is said by the officials to have had as a motive in so doing the fact that the United States forest service, in which her divorced husband was employed, preferred charges against Swenning for conduct unbecoming an officer and a gentleman and that they based these charges upon the divorce case which alleged adultery. The officials state that Mrs. Swenning in order that her ex-husband might clear himself secured the records in the case and altered them eliminating all mention of adultery.

County Clerk Coleman found the alleged alterations when the forestry service called on him for the records. He at once reported the matter to the court. Later it was brought to the attention of the grand jury which returned an indictment Friday.

Mrs. Swenning will be tried in the circuit court. The case will probably be called within the next ten days.

INDICT CUMMINGS FOR WHITE SLAVERY

Before adjourning Friday afternoon the grand jury returned an indictment against Bert Cummings now held for an accomplice before the fact in the Dedaskalous murder case, charging white slavery. Cummings is said to have lived off the illicit earnings of his wife, a mere girl, whom he married to escape a statutory charge.

Tom Frekas, Louis Christo, Nick Christo and Gus Pappos, all Greeks, were called as witnesses.

W. C. T. U. PLEADS FOR FIVE LIVES

At a recent meeting of the W. C. T. U. a petition was drawn and placed in the hands of members to circulate, giving voters a chance to protect against the executions of the five men scheduled for next Friday at Salem. The club endorsed the following sentiment:

"Believing that the sense of civilization is growing strongly against capital punishment, for the reason that it in no way tends to prevent murder, but in itself is brutalizing and accustoms society to the idea of taking life.

Wisconsin, Maine, Michigan and Rhode Island have no capital punishment and are freer from homicide than other states because convictions are more rapid and more certain. In the states having capital punishment juries, because of a reluctance to take life, set free as wholly innocent many men who ought to be confined. The W. C. T. U. adopted the following resolution:

"Believing at the next general election Oregon will in consistency with her forward place in the states,

abolish capital punishment, it seems to us almost uncivilized to order out these seven men for execution just in advance of this reform. Therefore, we petition Governor West to grant a temporary reprieve to these seven men until after the next general election. Believing every fair-minded man and woman will want to help in this matter, we ask for their assistance."

APPLES SHOULD BE KEPT WARM PLACE

The local United States weather bureau today issued a warning to orchardists now having apples stored in open buildings where they are not sheltered from the cold, to protect them from the present low temperatures or they stand a chance of losing them. Apples must not be exposed to a temperature lower than 32, and during the past few days the mercury has been down to 22. Friday night the temperature ranged between 26 and 28 throughout the night. The cold spell will continue.
