KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Dec. 9.—It is quite probable that the first federal position in this section that will be open for a democrat will be the superintendency of Crater Lake National park. F. W. ARAI, who has held the position ever since the park was established, has always been a strong partisan and was an ardent supporter of Taft during the recent campaign. It is said that he has some hope of retaining his position under a democratic president, but local democrats do not view the situation in this light. There are already four men seeking appointment under the new administration. All are democrats and were strong supporters of Wilson in the last campaign. They are H. E. Momyer, who has for several years been the chief ranger in the park; J. W. Bryant, one of the oldest settlers of the Klamath country and a southerner who served in the Confederate army; W. M. Whitlock, a local democrat who was active in the support of Wilson and Lane, and R. E. Hunsaker, another lifelong local democrat. While all are aspirants for the position it is very likely that some sort of an agreement will be reached whereby the full force of local democracy will be placed behind one of the four.
