

GLUT IN MARKET KEEPS APPLES LOW AT NEW YORK

NEW YORK, Dec. 10.—Cables from foreign markets are as follows: London—M. Isaacs & Sons cable that there is more demand figuring on holiday requirements and they quote on Watsonville Newtowns, 4 tiers, 6s 6d to 7s, and 4 1/2 tiers 5s 9d to 6s, but give no quotation on Oregon or Washington apples.

Liverpool—Messrs. L. Connolly & Co. cable the offerings are ample but the sales moderate and that their market is unchanged, which means Watsonville Newtowns, 4 tiers, 6s, and 4 1/2 tiers 4s 6d. They also give no report on Oregon apples but lately they have been making about 2s above the Watsonvilles, depending on quality, etc.

Shipments: There left New York last week the following boxed apples: Liverpool, 8,000; London, 10,500; Hamburg, 19,000; Bremen, 7,500; Glasgow, 3,000; various, 1,000. This makes a total of 49,000 against 78,700 the week before, and is a material reduction which may prove beneficial in causing higher prices on boxed apples in Europe, remembering also the increasing demand usually springing up about this time for holiday fruit.

As far as New York is concerned, the strike was settled at the end of last week. About 25 cars of apples were disposed of yesterday and today on the Erie wharf and the market is not a bit better than it was. Apples are selling all the way from \$1.00 to \$1.75 per box, only a few of something fine selling \$2.00 or over, and the great bulk of all the apples that are actually being sold go out at \$1.25 to \$1.50. At auction yesterday and today some apples from Spokane sold, Jonathans, \$1.20 to \$1.40; Wagners, \$1.05 to \$1.10; Idaho Beauties, 80c to \$1.05; yesterday one car from Oregon sold, Jonathans, 90c to \$1.00; Baldwins, 80c to 85c. Immense arrivals of oranges from Florida, California and Porto Rico are selling a little lower. A good many of the finest apples are going into cold storage.

Weather decidedly mixed, one day rainy and almost hot, next day clear and cooler.

START WORK SOON ON MOUNTAIN ROAD

Actual construction work will start soon on the new road the forestry service is constructing in the Blue Ledge country which will lead through the Cook and Green pass and down to the Klamath river. Locators have been at work and Supervisor Erickson of the Crater National forest left today for that territory to have the actual construction work start.

The construction of this road will open a new territory to Medford and will result in great benefit to this section. Trade from the mining camps in that neighborhood has been going a much longer distance to California owing to the lack of a road.

JIM LING IS TO BE TRIED AGAIN

The case of the state against Jim Ling, charged with assault with a deadly weapon upon the person of Wo Lee is to be tried again in the circuit court. The first trial resulted in a disagreement following which Ling was freed on his own recognizance and the case continued until the December term of court.

The case was brought up Monday in the circuit court and set down for trial following the other criminal cases on the docket.

SCHOOL TAX LEVY 10 MILLS

The school tax for the coming year was fixed at a special school meeting Monday afternoon at the high school at 10 mills for the coming year. This is slightly in advance of last year's levy.

According to members of the school board this levy will provide almost enough funds for year's expenses but will leave a small deficit.

\$1000 IS SENT TO FRISCO TO WAGER ON BUD ANDERSON

One thousand dollars was dispatched to San Francisco today by local admirers of Bud Anderson which is to be placed in the hands of Spike Slatterly, sporting editor of the San Francisco Call, to be used as he sees fit in order to secure a fifteen round go between Anderson and Willie Hoppe. Slatterly is to offer the money as a \$1000 side bet with Hoppe and if he cannot secure the go he is to try and get a match with Frankie Burns. The local men are confident that Anderson will secure a go and that he will get to top rung of the ladder before he is whipped.

BERT CUMMINGS IS NOT INDICTED

The new grand jury which was summoned Monday, was dismissed Monday afternoon until March 17, subject to a recall at any time by the court.

The grand jury took action in but one case, that of the state vs. Cummings for murder and in that returned not a true bill. Cummings was accused by Frank Seymour to be an accomplice before the fact in the Dedaskalous murder to which Seymour and Spanos confessed.

Cummings is now lodged in the county jail awaiting trial upon a charge of white slavery.

SCHOOL CHILDREN WIN LIBERTY BELL FOR FAIR

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 10.—Because of the plea of Mrs. Emma Doane, special representative from San Francisco, who personally presented to Mayor Blankenburg a huge petition containing more than 500,000 signatures of school children of California, that official today unqualifiedly favors sending the Liberty bell to the Panama Pacific exposition in 1915.
