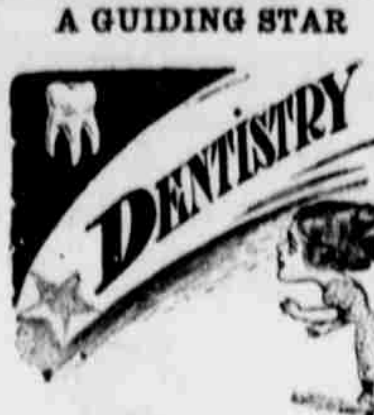
CINCINNATI SUFFERS \$700,000 LOSS BY FIRE
