The pleadings and importuning of a special delegation of men and women from Portland, waiting on him today, failed to move Governor West in his determination to see the four remaining men hanged and did not draw from him any admissions concerning Faulder's ultimate fate.

"I have received scores of threatening letters," said the governor. "I have seen my wife lay awake nights fearing for the safety of our little girl. I have gone through hell to make a winning fight against hanging but in ordering those men hung, I am living up to the dictates of my conscience. If those men do not go to the gallows tomorrow capital punishment will not be abolished during our lifetime."

It was some time before the governor would make this statement, but once he started to talk he showed how heavily the hangings weighed, not only on his own mind, but that of his wife.

"BABE" PICATO IS ACCUSED OF FRAME-UP FIGHT

OAKLAND, Cal., Dec. 12.—Charges of frame-up were freely voiced here today by fight fans who witnessed last night's ten round bout between "Babe" Picato, the Los Angeles lightweight and Tommy McFarland of San Francisco. McFarland entered the ring in poor condition, his manager trying to call off the bout at the last minute.

Picato had McFarland groggy several times and the spectators charge he could have finished the San Franciscan had he been so disposed. Referee Foley called the affair a draw, the fighters having agreed that such a decision should be rendered if both were on their feet at the finish.

POSTAL STILL BARRED FROM BASEBALL GROUNDS

CHICAGO, Dec. 12.—The American Baseball League meeting was adjourned today with the next meeting announced to take place in New York February 11.

No action was taken on the request of baseball writers that the Postal Telegraph Company be granted equal privileges with the Western Union in American League parks. The Postal is now barred from the parks.

LAURIER PLANS CANADIAN FLEET TO GUARD COAST

OTTAWA, Ont., Dec. 12.—In one of the greatest speeches of his career, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, former premier of Canada, announced in parliament today the Liberal navy plan as an alternative to the proposal of Premier Borden to contribute \$35,000,000 to the British navy.

Sir Wilfrid suggested a Canadian fleet for each Canadian coast with a super-dreadnaught as the center of each fleet, the establishment of shipyards in Canada, the building, so far as possible, of all the warships in Canada, and that the fleets be manned, so far as possible, by Canadians. He maintained that Canada would always be ready to aid England in an emergency.

Sir Wilfrid's speech was received with wild applause, the Liberals in the house rising and singing: "Rule Britannia," in a mighty chorus.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier concluded his wonderful appeal with an amendment to the Borden proposal expressing a lack of confidence in the policy of the Conservative government.

NORTHERN CALIFORNIA TO AID EXPOSITION

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 12.—Here to map out a plan of campaign for the success of the 1915 world's fair, more than 200 representatives of the principal northern California towns and cities, held a formal meeting in the exposition building here today, and were later tendered a luncheon at the San Francisco Commercial club.

GENERAL DENIALS BY IRON WORKERS

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Dec. 12.—John H. Barry of St. Louis, a former business agent for the International Association of Bridge and Structural Ironworkers, and one of the defendants in the dynamite conspiracy trial here, resumed his testimony today. He denied all the charges of the government.

Barry denied knowing that John McNamara spent \$10,000 on dynamite while Barry was auditing the accounts of the Ironworkers' Union. Brown was called after Barry had closed his testimony.

W. Bert Brown of Kansas City, a walking delegate for the Ironworkers' Union, was cross-examined regarding letters he wrote to John J. McNamara referring to non-union jobs which later were dynamited. He insisted that every reference he made to these jobs was legitimate.

Defendant Hannon, of Scranton, Pa., was next called. He admitted writing a letter to John J. McNamara, saying certain members of the Ironworkers' union in Scranton, "Don't know how to keep their mouths shut, and I am not ready to do time just now. I am prepared to do anything but you know how careful a man must be in this kind of work."

Hannon said he regretted writing the letter, after explaining that it referred to money needed by the Scranton local.

OLD DOC COOK GETS PHOTOGRAPHED

OAKLAND, Cal., Dec. 12.—Dr. Frederick A. Cook, who says he discovered the North Pole, visited Josephine Miller, the aged poet of the Sierras, today at Miller's home in the hills back of Oakland.

ALLEN CLAN GIVEN HEAVY PRISON SENTENCES

WYBESVILLE, Dec. 12.—Thirty-five years in the penitentiary is the penalty Sidna Allen will pay for his part in the shooting up of the Carroll county courthouse at Hillsville last March, when five persons, including the judge, sheriff and commonwealth attorney, were killed by members of the Allen clan and a number of others wounded. Wesley Edwards will spend twenty-seven years in the penitentiary.

These sentences were the result of a compromise this afternoon following a verdict of voluntary manslaughter in the case of Sidna Allen when the jury fixed the term of imprisonment at five years. Previously he had been sentenced to fifteen
