HIGHER PRICES IN LONDON MARKET FOR LOCAL FRUIT

W. Dennis & Sons send the following market report dated London, November 22:

After a long spell of depression here, it is pleasing to be able to report a change for the better in one branch at any rate of the apple business in London, namely for Hood River and Rogue River Newtowns. There has been a decided improvement this week in the demand and prices have advanced sensibly. We are now able to quote 9s to 10s for Hood River Newtowns and 8s 6 to 9s 6 for Rogue River and we have no hesitation in recommending our friends in these localities to despatch their shipments immediately. We are hopeful of being able to improve upon present prices and shall be glad therefore to receive a line from our friends that they are going to give us a share of their business.

With regard to Californian Newtowns, there is no more activity in the demand for four tiers, but there has been a better inquiry for 4 1/2 tiers at 5s 6 this week end.

There is nothing fresh to report about barrel apples and it will be seen that prices are about the same as last week.

The demand for Keiffer pears has been excellent and fine prices have been obtained.

The Liverpool market is weaker all round, arrivals having again been heavy. London prices: Rogue River Newtowns, 8s 6; Washington Newtowns, 8s 8; Hood River Spitz, 6s 8; Calif. Newtowns, 5s 6; Calif.
