

## FOUR MURDERERS PERISH ON SCAFFOLD

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had been full of the vigor of life.

At 12:45 a doctor touched the swaying corpse that had been Roberts and said: "Dead." Two minutes later he nodded, and the body of Morgan was cut down.

Two more wooden coffins were fetched. The "legal murder" was at an end.

Meanwhile Governor West was at the capitol having it out with the friends and foes of capital punishment. The attorneys of Morgan did not give up hope of reprieve until the last moment.

West Says He's Yellow Dog

"Every good movement to succeed," said the governor, his face as white as paper, his eyes burning in their sunken sockets, "must have a yellow dog for its toes to kick. I'm that dog. Hanging is all wrong. It is a medieval, barbarous practice. But the people of this state last month voted against the abolition of the people. They asked for this. Well, out at the prison at this moment they are having a bloody feast."

"But, Mister Governor," cried an attorney, "Morgan did not commit this crime. He didn't get a fair trial. He never had a day in court or a chance to tell the story."

The governor rose, warmly. "I love you. I believe Morgan didn't kill York with premeditation. All the more reason why he should die today. If I release him now, I know, I tell you I know that the movement to abolish hanging will be delayed for years."

Crucify Them, Crucify Them

The lawyer rose, too, and would have argued longer, but the governor checked him with a gesture.

"Morgan did not kill York with premeditation," he repeated. "But we will kill Morgan with premeditation. We will strangle him with Garrison and Roberts and Faulder. The people clamored for the lives of these men. They cried out 'Crucify them.' Crucify them."

With tears in his eyes, but with a sneering curl at the corners of his mouth, he concluded the interview: "It would be unfair to our invited guests, who have looked forward with so much pleasure to this event, to rob them of a single item on the program."

All day yesterday Governor West listened to the arguments, heated, tearful and prayerful, of delegations from all parts of the state representing the anti-hanging movement of which he himself is the champion.

John Taylor, alone of the condemned has been snatched back from the brink of the scaffold.

Lives Price of Reform

"The other men must die," said Governor West. "I pardoned them now, we would not see the end of the barbaric practice of hanging in our lifetime. The price of this reform is four lives."

The executions will take place at 11:30. The traps will be sprung two at a time. Frank H. Curtis, the former superintendent, resigned under pressure because his heart failed him at the prospect that he might be called upon to be the executioner.

His successor, B. K. Lawson, has told his wardens, John Bergen and Snodgrass that they must spring the traps.

In all likelihood Noble Faulder, will be one of the two to die first, as he is apparently the calmest of the quartet and has claimed the right to "blaze the trail."

Morgan Prays All Night

Mike Morgan spent his last night in prayer. He was seen late yesterday by Father Moore. "Mike will go quietly to his death," said the priest on leaving death row. Frank Garrison spent the hours of the night in polishing the speech which he is to deliver in the scaffold. He protests his innocence. Early this morning he asked if one of the guards, who had been kind to him, might come to death row. The guard came.

"You're about the only friend I've got," the condemned man said, "and I wanted to say good bye. I didn't kill Roy Perkins, and I want you to believe it, no matter what the world thinks. I'm not afraid."

Jack Roberts is as sullen and taciturn as ever. He handed to Captain Phillip E. Bauer last night a farewell to his sister, a rambling epistle full of brotherly love, religion and hate of society.

Chaplain Bauer will say the prayers for the condemned men while the black caps are being fitted on. Father Moore gave Mike Morgan absolution this morning.
