COLUMBIA, S. C., Dec. 12.—After declaring at the recent governors' conference that he favored the lynching of negroes who attacked white women, Governor Cole Blease here today paroled R. A. Richey, a wealthy white planter of Abbeville county, sentenced to ten years for assaulting a young girl in 1910.

The governor imposed a condition that Richey shall deposit a bond of \$5,000 that he will personally appear before the executive November 23, 1912, to receive what is then and there ordered by the governor.
