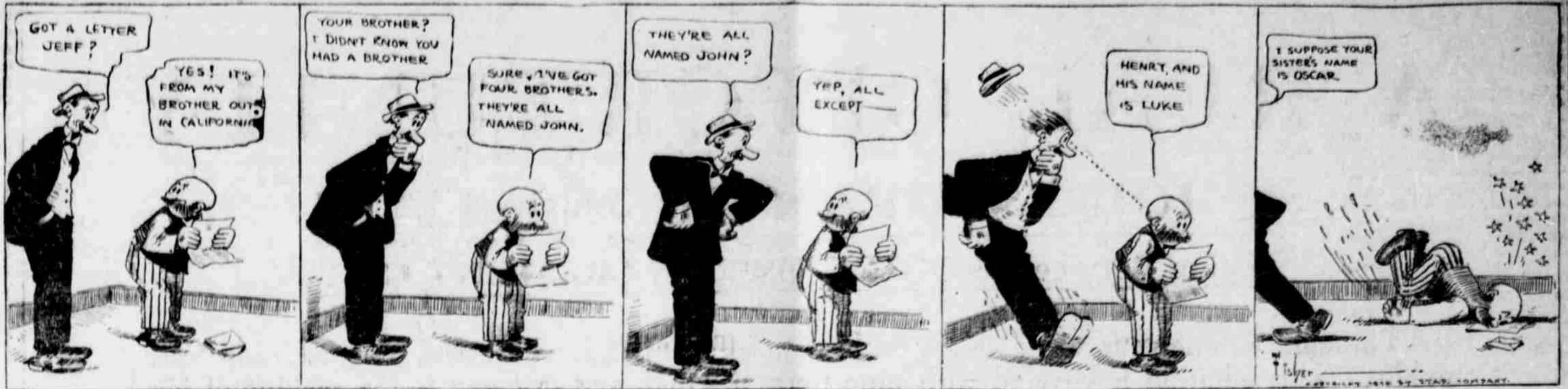


Isn't Mutt the Irritable Old Thing?

SCORES RESCUED FROM PITTSBURG LIBRARY FIRE

PITTSBURG, Pa., Dec. 13.—Scores of persons were rescued from a building called Library Place, which was destroyed by fire. There were 200 occupants of the building. A conflagration from the structure, injuring nine persons, including four firemen and one policeman. There are several persons unaccounted for, but it is not believed that any are dead.
