One of the most interesting women in Washington is Mrs. Ella Newsome Trader, who is called "Dixie's Florence Nightingale." Mrs. Trader gave her fortune of \$75,000 to the Confederate cause at the time of the civil war and is now employed in the Pension Office.

Mrs. Trader has said that she is saving every available cent she can for the purpose of publishing a book written about her by a Union soldier. This soldier, wounded on a Southern battlefield, was taken prisoner by the Confederates. He was one of those nursed back to life by Mrs. Trader, then Mrs. Ella Newsome.
