"We, the members of the Good Government league of Medford, Or. do adopt the following as our platform for the coming city election to be held on January 14, 1913;

Delinquent Assessments

That in all contracts, that the contract price of the completed work, be known and agreed upon before the contract is let.

That we recommend the immediate collection of all delinquent city assessments and interest thereon and if the laws now in force are not sufficient to compel a collection of said assessment that an adequate law be drafted and passed by the city conn-

That the city registration laws b amended so as to insure an honest

That the city secure as soon possible a suitable site for a public playground and park.

That the city engineer have charge of all street work and the office of street commissioner be abolished.

That the office of police magistrate be taken out of the hands of the mayor and be made elective.

Revoking Liquor Licenses

That we favor a rigid enforcement of the liquor laws, and that on seeand conviction upon violation of any of the provisions thereof, the license

That we favor giving the council the power to grant or refuse any applicant a liquor license.

That we favor an investigation of all contracts let by the city, for which bonds have been issued, that are now outstanding.

That in the granting of franchises. that great care be exercised to protect the city's interests.

That this league favors the appointment of a public matron.

That the employment of home labor on all public work is favored by That this league is in favor of the

passing of a city ordinance compelling saloons to close at 10 o'clock.
