Crandell, arrested on a charge of forgery in connection with the failure of "the Plain Dealer," a weekly newspaper here, was arraigned today, and waiving examination was bound over to the grand jury. It is alleged Crandell collected for the advertising in the single edition of "the Plain Dealer" printed, and after spending the money on himself, attempted to recuperate his losses by forging a check for \$4.80.

MORGAN DOMINATES TRUST (Continued from page 1.) \$1,989,000,000 and earning \$10,030,000 a year. The chart also showed that Morgan and company, together with the First National bank, the National City bank, the Guaranty Trust company and the Bankers' Trust company, have 118 directors in 34 banks and trust companies with resources of \$2,679,000,000 and deposits of \$1,983,000,000; thirty directors in ten insurance companies with assets of \$2,293,000,000; 195 directors in 32 transportation lines, capitalized at \$11,784,000,000; 63 directors in 35 industrial corporations, capitalized at \$3,339,000,000 and 26 directors in 12 public utility corporations, capitalized at \$2,150,000,000. How the Trust Works The data named all the corporations in which Morgan is alleged to be represented. It adds he has control of three voting trusteeships in the Guaranty Trust company, and one of three trustees in the Bankers' Trust company. Morgan is also alleged to be represented on the directorate of the Southern railroad and the Chicago, Great Western railroad. He controls two of the five directors of the Mercantile Marine company. Henry Davidson, William Porter and Thomas Lamont, members and directors of Morgan and company, are also directors of the Guaranty Trust company. It was also shown that these men control the Bankers' Trust company, the First National bank and other smaller banks. The chart also gives details of alleged concentration of money interest of 18 "financial giants."

INQUIRY PROVES BLIND ABUSED

OAKLAND, Cal., Dec. 18.—More sensational charges were heard today at the investigation of the State Industrial Institute for the Blind in Oakland, the most startling being that Superintendent Sanders had boasted openly that he had the investigation "all fixed" and that he would remain as superintendent and at the conclusion of the probe he would compel all inmates to work or leave the institution. Further charges of neglect on the part of House Physician H. N. Rowell also were made. Thomas George, a blind broom-maker, was the most important witness of the day. He testified that Superintendent Sanders told him on Dec. 10, the day the board of directors met, that he had the investigation fixed, that his position was secure and that every inmate of the institute would have to work or leave. Old men, George further testified, were left to "die like stray dogs in a shed," citing the cases of John Wickens and Dan Ahrens, who, he testified, died without any medical attendance whatever. At the conclusion of his testimony George appealed to the investigating committee to see that conditions in the institute were improved.

SPOKANE, Dec. 18.—With the naming of officers for the first six months and the mapping out of nine fruit districts articles of incorporation were drawn up here today and the organization effected of the North Pacific Fruit distributors, an association to market a large point of the fruit of Montana, Idaho, Washington and Oregon. The officers are: President, U. T. Clark of Wenatchee; vice-president J. H. Robbins of North Yakima; secretary, H. C. Sampson of Spokane; treasurer, H. P. Davidson of Hood River. The following is the apportionment of fruit districts. Wenatchee — Chelan, Dkanogan, Ferry, Douglas, Grant Counties. Yakima—York, Kitatitas, Benton and Franklin counties. Hood River—Hood River and Wasco counties in Oregon and Klickitat and Skamania counties in Washington. Western Oregon—All Oregon west of the Cascades. Walla Walla—Walla Walla and Columbia counties in Washington and Umatilla, Union, Wallowa, Baker counties and Snake river territory in Whitman county, all in Washington; Nez Perce, Lewiston and Idaho counties, including Letah, south of the American ridge. Spokane—All eastern Washington and northern Idaho. Montana—all Montana.

FRUIT MEN FORM NEW ASSOCIATION

WIDNEY UNABLE TO APPEAR IN COURT SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Dec. 18.—When the case of Mrs. Vivian Lyons, pretty Denver divorcee, was called in court here today, Robert J. Widney, wealthy real estate operator of Los Angeles, had not sufficiently recovered from the effects of the bullet wound received while in Mrs. Lyons' apartments to appear in court, and the hearing was set over for two weeks. Mrs. Lyons is at liberty on \$1500 bail. She is confident that Widney will not press the case.

DEVIL'S ISLAND BETTER THAN FRANCE

NICE, France, Dec. 18.—Holes Fauchier, escaped convict, prefers Devil's Island and three meals a day to France and starvation. He staggered into police headquarters here fainted and faint. After being revived he told how he had escaped from the dread penal settlement which was the scene of Captain Dreyfus' martyrdom, whither he had been sent in 1898 for robbery. "Since reaching France last summer," Fauchier said, "I have done my best to earn an honest livelihood, but have failed. I am without friends, food or shelter. Will you send me back to Devil's Island. Life there would be far more bearable than the miserable existence I have been forced to lead since my escape." The prisoner's statements were investigated and found to be substantiated by the records.

FALLS SEVEN STORIES AND MAY RECOVER

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 18.—In spite of a fractured skull, two broken legs, and a broken arm sustained when she fell from the seventh story of an office building, Miss Frances Groff, a magazine writer, has a fair chance of recovery from her injuries according to the statements today of surgeons attending her. Miss Groff was resting easily and fully conscious, the hospital bulletin stated. Attention was called, however, to the fact that no accurate gauge of the severity of the skull fracture can be made within forty-eight hours.

WIDNEY UNABLE TO APPEAR IN COURT

SANTA ANA, Cal., Dec. 18.—The young desperado who was killed yesterday after slaying one and wounding three of the posse which battled with him, was identified today as Joe Matlock, formerly of Eugene, Or. The identification was made by Dr. L. L. Whitson, a dentist, who formerly resided in the Oregon town. Whitson said Matlock was arrested in Eugene three or four years ago for a crime similar to that which he attempted Sunday, but left that vicinity after his release from jail. On a torn envelope in the dead man's pocket was written the name of H. L. Brown, and according to the dentist Brown was the sheriff at Eugene when Matlock was arrested. Sheriff Ruddock of Orange county, found a photograph of Matlock which had been sent out by the Eugene sheriff at the time of Matlock's departure and it bears a strong resemblance to the dead man's. Matlock was a son of former Mayor J. B. Matlock of Eugene.
