So long as the state and the city license them to do business, they are entitled to do so; but I am a strong advocate of law enforcement, as the laws exist, and when the laws are wrong, we have a remedy, it's up to the public. I firmly believe in development and progress, but not to the extent of reckless extravagance. We must guard against this recklessness, but not to the extent of retraction. I am strictly opposed to any special privileges as to locations, persons or corporations, but adhere rigidly to the best interests of the public. I believe that the same consideration is due to the ladies as to the men, in all our public affairs. (Paid Advt.)

For the information of the voters of Medford, I take this method of announcing my position on the principal questions of interest to the people of our city. Our water rates should be revised so that the cost of maintenance, and the necessary contributions to the sinking fund may be equitably distributed among the consumers, but no surplus should be accumulated at the expense of the rate payer. The work of the finance committee and of the other principal committees of the council should be open to suggestion and subject to criticism, and the criticism, suggestions, and co-operation of representatives of our various civic bodies should be invited and encouraged in such work. If elected I pledge myself to use my utmost endeavor to carry out the ideas outlined above, and to give Medford an impartial, progressive, business administration. (Paid Advt.)
