COMMUNICATIONS
Special Road Levies.

To the Editor:
Would you be kind enough to an-
swer the questions in this communi-
cation?

Road district No. 2 has advertised
a meeting to be held for the purpose
of voting a special tax for road pur-
poses.

1. Do the taxpayers of this dis-
trict have the right to regulate our
present road tax? Or does the dis-
trict vote special tax for road pur-
poses independent of our present
road tax?

2. The law says: That it takes
the majority of the taxpayers in the
district to vote a special road tax. If
there is not a majority of the tax-
payers present at this meeting would
a majority vote of those present at
this meeting be legal?

3. Can this special road tax be
levied for more than one year at
this special meeting?

Answers:

1. The taxpayers meeting does
not regulate the general road tax,
but votes a special tax for road pur-
poses for the district only, independ-
ent of the general road tax.

2. A majority of the taxpayers
present at the meeting votes the
special levy, just as a majority at
the district school meeting votes the
school levy.

3. The tax can only be levied for
one year.

RESULT OF IGNORING THE LAW.

THE decision of the supreme court in the Medford bridge case sustains the Mail Tribune's contentions and shows that had the county treasurer obeyed the law as long since urged by the Mail Tribune, and kept money raised for road purposes in the road fund, instead of illegally transferring it to the general fund to redeem old warrants, that new warrants would have been kept at par because the money for redemption, raised by this year's levy, would have been on hand.

The law as outlined in section 6320 Lord's Code, is very plain upon the subject. As the supreme court says:

One-half of the road fund received has been apportioned to the several road districts of the county as required by that section. It then became the duty of the county officers to set apart the remaining one-half of the moneys received from the road fund levy, into a general road fund to be expended for county roads and bridges, under the direction of section 6320 the county officers failed to comply with, but instead mingled the moneys received from the general county fund levy, and the half of the road fund moneys remaining after the apportionment to the road districts, and turning the whole thereof into the county general fund. From this combined fund the county treasurer has redeemed county general fund warrants of the county, aggregating \$72,350.26, besides some county warrants re-
deemed from funds obtained from other sources than the 1911 taxes.

This fund is, by the terms of the statute, a special road fund of Jackson county. Section 6320 authorizes the levy for a road fund and specifies how the same may be expended. The county court in its discretion, may or may not make the levy. It cannot be compelled to do so. But that court has no authority to expend such funds for any purpose other than as di-
rected by the statute.

The court further holds that when the road fund is exhausted, and an emergency shall arise demanding immediate action, "the county courts are authorized in their discretion to apply any money in the county treasury, not otherwise appropriated, towards defraying expenses of building or repairing bridges." So that while the general fund can be used for bridge purposes, the road fund can not be used for general fund purposes or the redemption of warrants. Says the court:

To hold that the legislature intended to make the road fund of a county subject to the payment of warrants issued during any prior years, would be to hold that the law makers intended to provide a system which in operation would violate the constitution, and permit indebtedness in-
curred in one year, in excess of the amount permitted by the constitution to be paid for in another. This would defeat the object in view.

It is therefore self evident that county warrants issued during 1912 are of par value, for the money to pay them was raised and should be in the county treasury. The sole cause of their depreciation, was the action of county officials in refusing to follow the law's instructions and keep the monies in separate funds, instead of redeeming old warrants and abetting the operations of warrant shavers with resultant loss to both taxpayers, laborers and sellers of supplies.

The suit brought by Benton Bowers has not been in vain. Though based upon prejudice and false legal premises, it has indicated clearly the cause of warrants, being at a discount—and in all probability the new county court will rigidly enforce the law. If it does not, the bondholders of officials should.

It is evident that in order to pay interest on outstanding warrants and reduce the indebtedness gradually, a special levy will have to be made, or a bond issue authorized, to take them up, thereby effecting a reduction in interest charges. Either method will preserve the credit of the county and unravel the tangled mess of the county finances.

MEDFORD VINDICATED.

IN their reports of the hearing of the Medford rate bill before the federal court, the Portland papers, especially the Oregonian, showed that they hold a brief for the railroads and the Portland jobbers. The reports published were extremely biased and show but one side of the controversy.

Perhaps no greater vindication of the unselfish endeavor of Medford in her tireless labor for equality of freight rates for the people of Oregon can be cited than the voluntary statement of counsel for the railroads in the argument for the restraining order.

Counsel for the railroads earnestly argued that if this law is enforced "it will put every town and city in Oregon upon an exact equality with each other so far as state distribution is concerned." In reply to this statement the attorney-general said this was a "most desirable thing to accomplish and in exact accord with the state constitution that the rights of all are equal."

This silence for all time the unkind accusations that a selfish ambition inspired and actuated the purpose of Medford that she was trying to secure privileges instead of establishing principles in rate making wherein the rights of all are considered and preserved.

It was further shown to the court by counsel for the people and admitted by the counsel for the railroads that the rules most objected to by the railroads were already in use by them, and that the law introduced no new and radical method but simply sought to extend uniformly the practice of the railroads to include all the classified articles of commerce. It was shown the court that the principle sought for by the act was in operation both as to specific rates and in the freight classification. The examples cited were admitted by counsel for the railroads to the court.

It was clearly represented to the court that the law imposed no duty on the railroads to cancel commodity rates or to advance a single rate under its provisions. This was the position taken by the railroads that it did compel them to do so and thus restrict the movement of traffic which would confiscate their property. The O. W. R. & N. Co. admitted that 90 per cent of its traffic was interstate and thereby would not be affected under state regulation. This showing fully demonstrates the necessity for such a revision of rates that will preserve the development of local interchange instead of the exploitation of the state's resources for the enrichment of residents of other states.

CHRISTMAS RUSH ON AT POSTOFFICE

The busiest bunch of employees in Medford right now are those in the postoffice, but notwithstanding the tremendous rush there in handling Christmas mail the clerks have been able to keep abreast of the work without the employment of additional help.

Thursday 20 large boxes of Christmas packages were sent out and it is expected that even a greater amount than this will be sent out each day until Christmas. While this great amount of mail moving through the postoffice ordinarily would necessitate the addition of more help still, the efficiency of the force and the individual desire of each employee to do his part has made it possible to dispatch every piece of mail matter on the first out-going train after it was received, and the same may be said of the carriers, who have been able thus far to make prompt daily delivery of all mail received. Saturday one extra carrier will be put on for a couple of weeks.

WIFE MUST TESTIFY IN WHITE SLAVE CASES

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 20.—With the theory firmly established that a wife must testify against her husband where it has been shown that the latter married to escape a white slave charge, Harry Schloss today stands convicted in the federal court. His bail was placed at \$5,000, which he was unable to furnish.

Schloss was charged with having brought Anna Kurtzman from Chicago to Portland for immoral purposes, and then to have married her in Oregon City to escape a white slave charge.

HORSE RACING IN MEXICO TO FLOURISH

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Dec. 20.—It was announced here today that the Mexican government has granted an amusement concession in Baja California to a syndicate composed partly of Americans and headed by F. E. Jaggia, a resident of Mexico City.

According to the terms of the contract, horseracing will be allowed 120 days each year, and bullfights, boxing contests, cocking mains and all forms of athletic exercises may be conducted.

The plant will be located either in Tia Juana, just across the border from San Diego, or at Rosendale, 100 miles south, the promoters say.
