200 JAPS KILLED IN COAL EZPLOSION

TOKIO, Dec. 23.—As a result of a terrible explosion in the 'Hara colliery at Sapporo on the island of Hokkaido today more than 200 Japanese coal miners were entombed and all are believed to be dead.

Only three men working in the galleries of the pit when the explosion occurred were brought to the surface and the mine officials hold out no hope for the others.

DIED.

Oliver McKeever died at his family residence on North Riverside Sunday morning at 7:15, after several weeks' illness due to a complication of troubles. While comparatively a late settler in Medford, he was well known to the residents of the past decade and especially in his immediate neighborhood, where his genial and charitable character had made a lasting impression.

The deceased was a native of Pennsylvania and at the time of his death was 56 years, 11 months and 6 days of age. He moved west to Missouri and was married at Mendon in that state March 6, 1881. After another move to Nebraska Mr. and Mrs. McKeever crossed the plains by team in 1882 and settled upon a homestead in Union county, Ore., where they lived until 1894, when they moved to Klamath county, and in 1896 made their last home in Medford, Mr. McKeever having since been engaged in horticultural and agricultural pursuits.

The deceased is survived by a widow and five children, the latter being Emmett of Fort Klamath; Beulah of Medford, Roy of Medford and Mand Hockenyoos and Clyde of Portland; also by his father, mother, a brother and a sister at Mendon, Mo., a sister at Pawnee City, Neb., and a brother of Fort Rock, Oregon.

Funeral services will be held at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon at the residence of the widow, Mrs. McKeever, 128 North Front street.

Interment will be in the cemetery at 2 o'clock.
