\$10,000,000 LUMBER SYNDICATE ORGANIZED

ASTORIA, Ore., Dec. 23.—A. S. Kerry, Seattle capitalist, today began negotiations here for the incorporation of a timber holding company, to be capitalized at \$10,000,000 to conduct development operations for some of the big lumber companies.

It is probable the new concern will act for the Booth Kelly company, with 2,000,000,000 feet of standing timber in the Nehalem valley.

The construction of a logging railroad 21 miles in length will be the first improvement.

NO \$500,000 BUILDING FOR OREGON AT FAIR

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 23.—Following the lead set by Dr. Wood of Washington county, a representative in the legislature, in which he demands Oregon's contemplated \$500,000 to the San Francisco fair be cut down to \$150,000, the Multnomah county legislative delegation will urge that the request for a half million appropriation be thrown out. It is the consensus of opinion that the state cannot afford it, and such a sum would not at all be in keeping with the \$90,000 appropriated to the Lewis and Clark exposition by California.

CRAZY SUFFRAGETTES RUIN CHRISTMAS GIFTS

LONDON, Dec. 23.—More than a million persons are personally affected today by the continued activity of militant suffragettes pouring acid, ink and other black fluids into mail boxes. Christmas presents to the value of thousands of dollars have been ruined.

Suffragette leaders admit they consider this latest method of attack the most effective so far devised, and the police force apparently is powerless. There have been but few arrests, the women dropping the fluids in the boxes while apparently mailing letters.
