Suzanne Seity as her husband's co-respondents. Brokaw's attorneys denied the charges, and accused Mrs. Brokaw of improper conduct with three men, including Baron Alexander Von Hochwucher, Maurice Gray and a third man whose name is unknown.

SWIFT PLANS TO TAKE CHEESE OUTPUT

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 27.—A well founded rumor is current today that Swift and company and other large eastern packers are planning to tie up the big Tillamook cheese factories this season by contracts, with the option of purchasing them outright next season. The factory people are generally frowning upon the proposition, it is stated. The Tillamook producers are being guided by the experience of one eastern capitalist, who secured the output of one of the factories with such unsatisfactory results that milk producers received five cents a pound less for their butter fat than the other factories were paying.

MATE HURLS NEGRO OFF SHIP INTO SEA

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 27.—That John Berberman, second mate of the power schooner Leonor, now being held by the Mexican authorities threw overboard Thomas Hunt, a big negro, following a terrific battle during the early hours of December 18 and that a general mutiny followed, is declared in mail advices here today. The ship was off the coast of Mexico at the time.

The fight was the result of threats issued against Berberman, it is said, because of his treatment of the crew.

Hunt was alone at the wheel. About 2:30 a. m. cries for help were heard. Investigation revealed traces of blood all over the aft deck, smashed woodwork and other evidence of a frightful struggle. The wheel was lashed and the negro missing. The schooner laid to for five days in the hope of finding Hunt's body. The sea was infested with sharks and it is believed the negro was devoured almost as soon as he struck the water.

ATTELL BROTHERS COME TO VISIT SICK MOTHER

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 27.—Cheered by the arrival home of her sons, Abe and Monte Attell, Mrs. Attell, who has been seriously ill here for some time, showed marked improvement today, and her ultimate recovery is expected. Monte has been away two years, during which time he participated in twenty fights. His last bout was Johnny Kilbane, featherweight champion, which was stopped in the eighth round to save Attell from a knockout.

JURORS STILL DEBATE

With the exception of Olat A. Tveitmo, all the defendants were smiling and apparently unconcerned when they appeared in court at 9:30 o'clock this morning. The San Franciscan wore a serious expression while Defendants Young, Shireman, Benn, Smythe, Ray and Anderson joked and laughed uproariously.

The jurors wore serious expressions when they appeared to go to lunch.

The defendants consider Judge Anderson's charge favorable to them, especially that portion ordering the jury before convicting to be certain the defendant is guilty of conspiracy and committed an overt act in pursuance with a plot. The defendants say they consider the jury a fair one and are confident of acquittal.

United States Marshal Schmidt said this afternoon he did not expect any trouble in case of the jury returning a verdict of guilty, but admitted he was prepared for an outbreak. No one is permitted to approach the juryroom.
