For the information of the voters of Medford, I take this method of announcing my position on the principal questions of interest to the people of our city. If elected, my time and services will always be available to the public and suggestions and criticisms will at all times receive most careful consideration. When ever it is apparent that the majority of our citizens are united in opinion opposite to my individual views, I will yield to the majority, regardless of my personal opinions. Our public market should be encouraged and developed along such lines as will result in the greatest advantage to the community. Our laws regarding sanitary conditions should be actively enforced, and supplemented by others if the existing ordinances are inadequate. Our water rates should be revised so that the cost of maintenance, and the necessary contributions to the sinking fund may be equitably distributed among the consumers, but no surplus should be accumulated at the expense of the rate payer. The work of the finance committee and of the other principal committees of the council should be open to suggestion and subject to criticism, and the criticism, suggestions, and co-operation of representatives of our various civic bodies should be invited and encouraged in such work. If elected I pledge myself to use my utmost endeavor to carry out the ideas outlined above, and to give Medford an impartial, progressive, business administration. (Paid Advt.)

ORDINANCE NO. 710.

An ordinance making the annual tax levy of the city of Medford, Oregon, and the Medford Road District for the year 1912. The city of Medford doth ordain as follows: Section 1. There shall be levied for the year 1912, the following taxes upon the assessed valuation of all the taxable property in the city of Medford, Oregon, as shown by the assessment roll for Jackson county, Oregon, for the year 1912, for the following purposes, to-wit: For Interest Fund, for payment of interest on bonded city debt, two and five-tenths (2 5-10ths) mills on the dollar. For street and road purposes, one and five-tenths (1 5-10ths) mills on the dollar. The levy for street and road purposes shall be levied upon all the taxable property in the city of Medford, and in the Medford Road District. For general sewer purposes, one and five-tenths (1 5-10ths) mills on the dollar. For Fire Fund, one and two-

tenths (1 2-10ths) mills on the dollar. For Light Fund, one and two-tenths (1 2-10ths) mills on the dollar. For Library Fund, six-tenths (6-10ths) of a mill on the dollar. For general city purposes, seven-tenths (7-10ths) of a mill on the dollar. For the purpose of providing a Sinking Fund for the bonded city debt five-tenths (5-10ths) of a mill on the dollar. For Park Fund, two-tenths (2-10ths) of a mill on the dollar. Sec. 2. It is hereby made the duty of the city recorder to certify to the county clerk of Jackson county, Oregon, the levy made by this ordinance. The foregoing ordinance was passed by the city council of the city of Medford, Oregon, this 28th day of December, 1912, by the following vote: Watt, aye; Mitchell, aye; Emerick, aye; Campbell, aye; Millar, aye; and Summerville, aye.
