

PRESBYTERIANS CONTRIBUTE \$700

At a "get-together" social held in the Presbyterian church Friday night to talk over the interests of the church, the congregation got together under the direction of E. A. Welch and raised \$700 in the record-breaking time of fifteen minutes to pay the paving and street assessment on the church property at Ugo and Main streets. The pastor, Rev. W. F. Shields, reported the church in flourishing financial condition, and reported as follows on the general situation:

"The church year begins with April 1. Since April this church has grown more rapidly than any other church in the Presbytery of southern Oregon. At last spring's meeting of the Presbytery we reported 287 members. Since then some have moved away without taking letters, and others have been dismissed to unite with the church where they now live. Two of our members have been called by the Master to the mansions above. In all we have lost twenty-two of our people. Before our church was enlarged we received 21 members, and since we have been in the new auditorium we have received 42 members, making in all 63 since April 1. We will receive between ten and twenty at our next communion, January 12. We have received larger accessions to the church this year up to date than ever before in the same time.

Our Sunday school was crippled by the vacancy caused by the building, and now by sickness, but just before the scare of scarlet fever it gave promise of surpassing any previous Sunday school of this church. We never had more efficient superintendents of the two departments of our Sunday school than we have now, nor better teachers.

"We never had as good singing and music in the services of the church as we have now, and it is our purpose to keep this high standard. We never had so nice a church auditorium. Never have our people been more general in doing for the church. The Ladies' Aid has done wonders, lifting more than \$400 indebtedness in three months. The pulpit and church have been made beautiful by individual gifts, the decorations never were so fine nor so beautiful in arrangement. The young people have done nobly their part.

"The Senior Christian Endeavor society and the Junior have both done well. Both have grown in numbers and the spiritual life in both is developing. The F. L. L. develops the social life of our young people. The young people decorated the chapel and put in the lights. The Woman's Missionary society has been leading the church in thought and work of missions. We had a week of mission study, two weeks of evangelistic meetings and are about to observe the week of prayer. We realize that our work is here and in all the world. Now, I ask your increase of loyalty to the church and its services, that rich blessings may be ours in increased measure. It is an inspiration to the pastor and a power for good when each and every member is present at the services."

The social at the Presbyterian church last night was one of the greatest successes ever known in the history of the church. A large crowd of people turned out in spite of the inclement weather. An excellent program of music was rendered by the orchestra. Mrs. Florence Halliday Haight sang two selections. Herbert Alford delighted the people with a solo, a mandolin solo by Mr. Hamilton and a piano duet by Miss Wortman and Miss Drew. A good spirit prevailed.

J. H. Cooley, E. A. Welch and W. H. Gore kept the people amused and interested. Every one went home pronouncing the social the best that they had ever attended. The Presbyterian church looks to the future with radiant hope.

CODFISH TRUST ON COAST TO BE PROBES

SEATTLE, Jan. 4.—That there is an organized codfish trust on the Pacific coast of which F. Tillman junior of San Francisco, is the promoter, is the charge made today by P. J. Waage, who owns 11,500 shares out of 35,000 in the King and Winge codfish company here. Waage in a suit begun Friday alleges that when he refused to dispose of his stock, Tillman bought up all the stock except his own and came into control of the King and Winge company in June, 1910. Since then, Waage alleges, the business has run at a deliberate loss, Tillman's San Francisco company buying the local fish at great profit. Waage wants a receiver appointed and \$10,000 damages.

PRICES FOR APPLES IN LONDON MARKET

Dennis & Son issue the following market report dated London, Dec. 13: Arrivals in London this week have been very light and barrel apples have again gone out well at higher prices. A Nova Scotian boat, the "Rappahannock," with 27,000 barrels, has just arrived, but we only managed to get a few hundred barrels out of her in time for sale today. As will be seen from quotations below, prices were comparatively satisfactory and we are expecting to have a very good sale on Monday next when the bulk will be offered. Quantities next week will be large it is true, but we are looking to the Christmas demand for a rapid clearance at current prices.

The demand for Keiffers has gone off completely and there has been a further drop in prices this week both for boxes and barrels.

Box Newtowns remain about the same. There is no alteration in conditions on the Liverpool market except that Newtowns are higher this week.

U'REN RUSHES TO GLAVIS' DEFENSE

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Jan. 4.—"A half truth is the worst sort of a lie and this is the kind of a falsehood of which Surveyor-General Kingsbury has been guilty."

This, in part, is what Milton T. U'Ren, involved with Louis R. Glavis former secretary of the state conservation commission, who was charged with using his office to further private interests, has to say concerning the allegations made by Kingsbury.

"Any statement that either Mr. Glavis or myself have acted against the interests of the state, or that the state has any interest whatever in the land which is the subject of the applications before the interior department at Washington is an infamous falsehood."

So far all efforts to obtain a statement from Glavis have failed.

ASK NATION TO RAISE BAIL MONEY

CHICAGO, Jan. 4.—A national campaign to raise bonds of \$1,070,000 for the release on bail of the 32 union men convicted at Indianapolis for conspiracy illegally to transport explosives and who were granted a writ of superseades here late yesterday by the United States circuit court of appeals, was started here today.

The defense attorneys expect to raise this fund from the local unions with which the convicted men are identified. Attorney Zoline announced that a large part of the amount required already had been pledged.
