BUILD HIGHWAY TO HOOD RIVER

NO BONDS FOR UNION TRAITOR

As a result of a complaint, alleging that several small girls in the Puritan town of Mystic, Conn., were not being properly treated, two of the foremost men in the town killed themselves rather than face disgrace. One hurled himself to death and the other hanged himself. Three more are in jail and four are fugitives. All are church men, past middle age, and two of them are G. A. R. veterans.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 7.—The county court has today tentatively decided to spend \$75,000 toward the completion of the highway between Portland and Hood River. The road was started years ago, but did not get much further than the surveys.

County Road Superintendent Chapman figures that the entire project will cost \$127,000, but states this sum can be cut 27 per cent through the employment of convict labor. It is planned to have the road completed in time to take care of the big tourist travel expected during the 1915 fair in San Francisco.

HITSON CANDIDATE TO SUCCEED HIMSELF

Chief of Police Hitson states that there is no truth in the published report that he is not a candidate to succeed himself as chief under the incoming administration. "I am taking no part in the election," said Chief Hitson, "and not playing politics. If I am reappointed it will be because I have made good, and attended to my duties, not because I have favored any candidate."

LEAVENWORTH, Kans., Jan. 7.—Herbert S. Hoekin, former treasurer of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Ironworkers, serving a six year sentence in the federal prison here, for conspiracy to transport dynamite, who has been generally ostracized by the other dynamite prisoners, learned today that the other thirty-two labor leaders under sentence here had signed blank bonds and that their release was promised.

Hoekin asked the deputy warden, "What has been done about my release?" The deputy warden replied that the international union had taken no action in his case so far as known. Hoekin made no comment.

Acting President McClory of the Ironworkers' Union, it is understood, left enough money with Warden McCloughrey to pay for the transportation of thirty of the prisoners to their homes when released.
