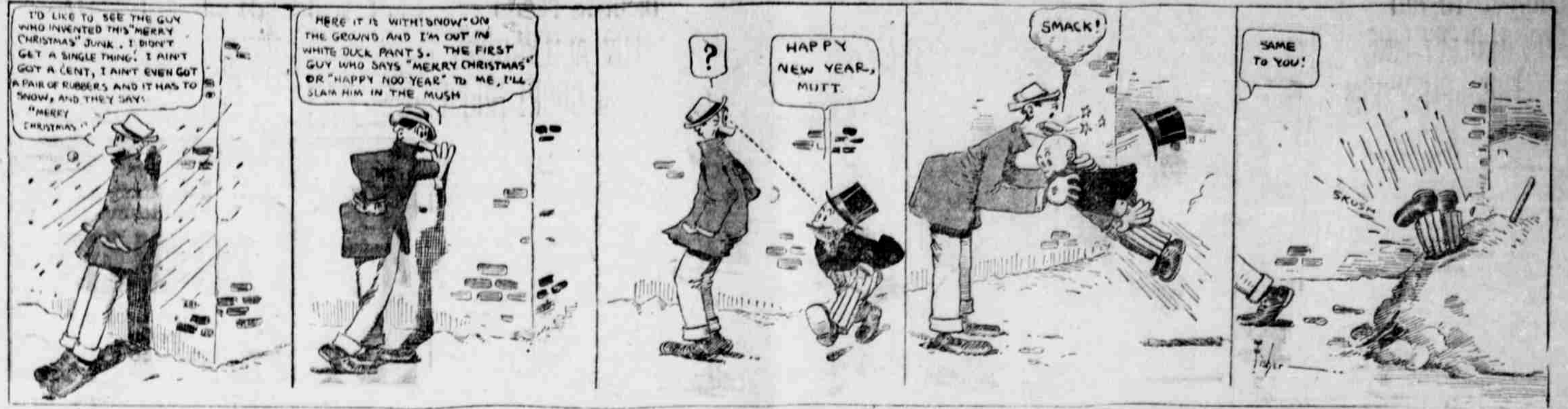

Now, as to the public market, I want to say that I am, and always have been, a strong advocate of the public market. I was among the first of the council to favor and promote it. I feel that the success of our market is due as much to my efforts as any other member of the council. I firmly believe in government and progress, but not to the extent of reckless extravagance. We must guard against this recklessness, but not to the extent of retraction. The work of the finance committee and of the other principal committees of the council should be open to suggestion and subject to criticism, and the criticism, suggestions, and co-operation of representatives of our various civic bodies should be invited and encouraged in such work.
