# SHIPS OF WAR

Germany Secretly Changing and Constructing Battleships and Cruisers -Protected Cruisers Changed to Armored Type.

War Scare Being Sounded in Great Britain to Secure Mora Battleships in British Navy.

LONDON, Jan. 11 .- That Germany has been secretly changing and constructing battleships and eruisers is the startling news published today by the Manchester Courier. According to that newspaper, sic new German battleships which have recently been constructed in German shippards, are armored cruisers and virtually invulnerable, although supposed by the European powers to be merely the ordinary protected type.

Still further, the Courier declares that the German Admiral today, instead of laying down tweive torpedo destroyers last year, according to the published program, 24 of these ships were built. These additions practically place the German naval list of this year far ahead of what it is now.
