ASK WILSON TO BUST DEADLOCK ELECT SENATOR

President-elect Requested to Take Hand in Legislature's Tie-up at Springfield, But Will Refuse to Take Sides in Controversy.

TINY CHILDREN FORCED TO WORK IN CANNERIES

Congressional Probe of Conditions in Trust Establishments Asked—Factories Abound in Filth, Rats and Disease States Miss O'Reilly.

Most of Children Are From Six to Ten Years Old and Labor Ten Hours.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—Support to Congressman Allen's resolution demanding a congressional probe of the Eastern Canning industry was given before the house rules committee here today by Mary Boyle O'Reilly who declared she learned of conditions by posing as a canning operative.

Living conditions are frightful, as many as 3 and 4 families living in a single shack. Most of the child employees are from six to ten years old and earn from ten to twenty cents daily for ten hours labor.

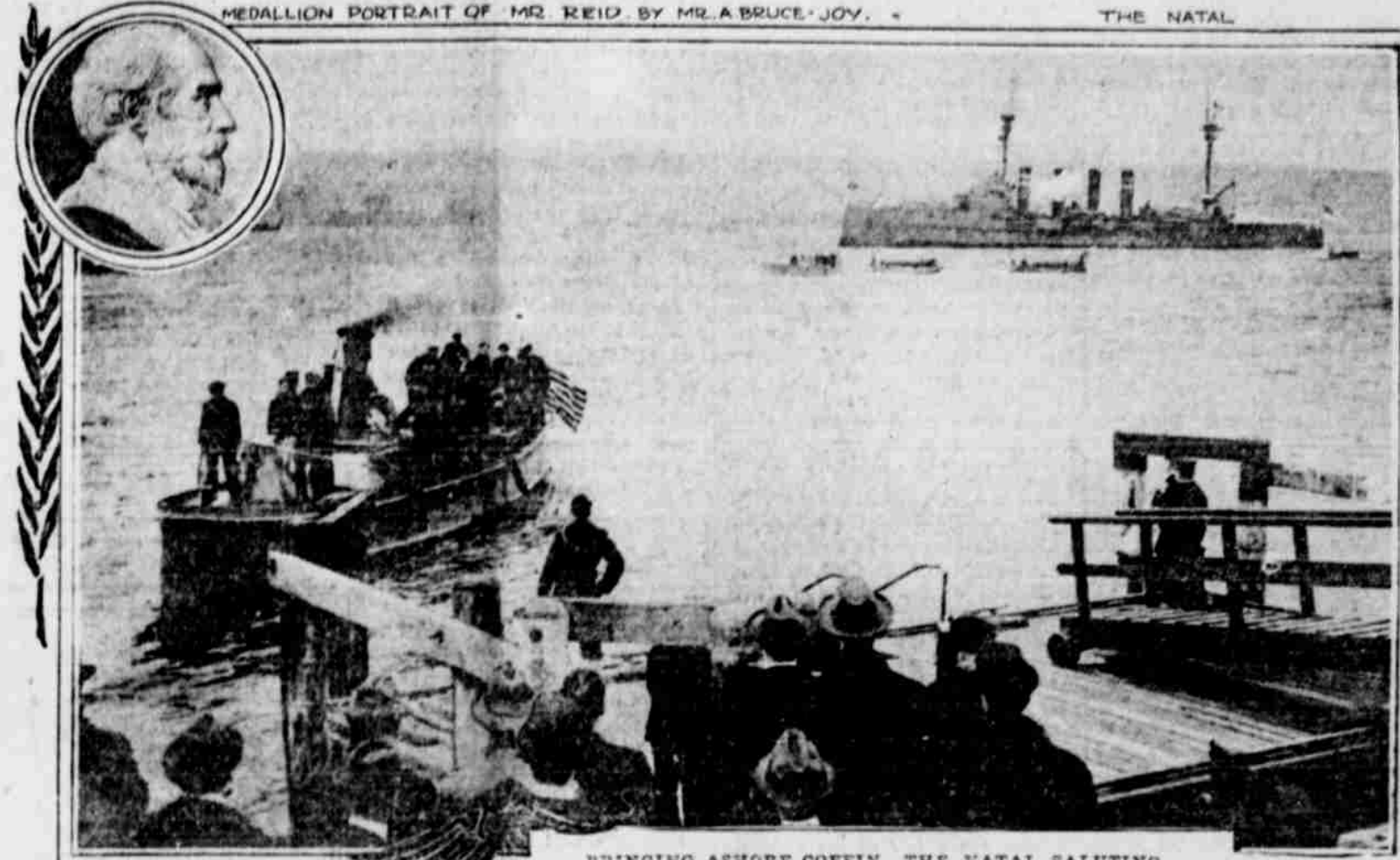
STOCKS CLIMB BRISKLY ON WALL STREET
