WASHINGTON, Jan. 13.-The maximum penalty provided by impeachment laws was imposed upon Judge Robert W. Archbald of the commerce court late today by the with which he was charged. This ittjudiciary, including the commerce court, and disqualification from ever holding a government office.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 13,-The ermine was torn from the shoulders of Judge Robert W. Archbaid of the commerce court here today when he was convicted by the United States senate of "misbehavior and misdemeanor of office." The jurist was found guilty of five of the 13 articles with which he was charged the first, third, fourth and thirteenth.

After voting continuously for three hours, the senate went into executive session to decide whether Archbald should be forever disqualified from any other federal office or merely removed from his present position. Conviction on any one of the 13 artieles carried with it a penalty of removal from the bench.

The highest vote in favor of Archbald came on article ten when every senator voted for acquittal except Senator Ashurst of Arizona.

### Archbald Hears News

While the voting was in progress Judge Archbald and Mrs. Archbald were sequestered in a committee room, the house sergeant at arms shielding them from a curious crowd which filled the corridors. The only break in their scelusion was when a page approached with the result of each vote.

### WHAT'S THE MATTER WITH ROCKEFELLER

WASHINGTON, Jan. 13 .- Telegraphic report of the exact condition of Wm. Rockefeller, wanted as a witness before the house money trust investigating committee, was received today by Chairman Pujo from Dr. Charles Richardson, the committee's medical expert, who was sent to Miami, Fla., to examine the millionaire oil magnate. Pujo refused to divulge the contents of the report.

Rockefeller's private physicians have asserted that his life would be endangered if he were to appear before the committee at this time. They allege he is suffering from throat trouble and other ailments which would be aggravated by examination by the probers.

Dr. Richardson is due from Miami Wednesday, and will then give the committee a full report of Rockefeller's condition. Representative Pulo stated that if the physicians diagnosis bears out the affidavits of Rockefeller's physicians, the committee will not insist on the millionaire coming to Washington.
