PORTLAND, Jan. 16.—John Torgerson, who robbed the post offices of the Rogue River valley, arrived here in custody of federal officers this morning.

Wanted For Murder Sheriff J. W. Boyd of Red Bluff is also here, endeavoring to have the authorities turn Torgerson over to him for prosecution on the charge of murder.

Woman Tells Her Story The woman, 22 years old, and slender and evenly, said she was acquainted with Torgerson for some time before he committed the murder.

LEEVEY ATTENDS STATE MEETING OF COMMISSIONERS

County Commissioner W. C. Leever is attending the annual session of the Oregon county commissioners at Portland and will go to Salem as a member of the committee appointed to urge upon the legislature the passage of an enabling act permitting counties to bond up to 2 per cent of their valuation.

Declaring there is "no equality, no justice, no common sense," in the present system followed by the various counties in levying assessments on percentage valuations, County Judge Spring, of Crook county, introduced a resolution calling for the assessment of property in the state at full cash value.

The convention went on record as favoring the repeal of the statute enabling the county court of each county appropriate \$2000 annually for the care of neglected cemeteries.

WOULD HAVE STATE LOAN FARMERS MONEY

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 16.—Contending that 20,000,000 acres of untitled lands in the state of Oregon will never be developed as long as the settler has to depend on high-priced money, Representative Howard, of Douglas county, will introduce a bill in the house in the next few days, and providing for the issuance of bonds by the state and the loaning of the money derived from them at a low rate of interest to settlers.

HOWARD WOULD ABATE NUISANCE FOR YEAR

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 16.—If a bill introduced by Representative Howard, of Douglas county, is enacted into law it will become the duty of a district attorney when advised that any place is used for improper purposes to institute equity proceedings to abate it on the ground that it is a nuisance.
