INTERESTING MEETINGS OF WOMEN'S CLUBS.

The fire in which the girl was injured occurred when the father mistook gasoline for coal oil in kindling a fire. Although her clothes were burned from her body, the girl ran half a mile to summon aid. When the neighbors arrived at her home the other members of the family were dead.

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PARENTS AND TEACHERS DISCUSS SCHOOL AFFAIRS

The controversy between County Judge Tou Velle and the County Superintendent, J. Percy Wells over school superintendency was aired in the Parents-Teachers' meeting Friday and an effort made to have the supervisory system in effect approved. Portions of the diaries of the two supervisors were read and six school teachers spoke in favor of the supervisors. On motion of Mrs. G. F. King, the matter was referred to a committee consisting of Mrs. E. E. Gore, Mrs. Kinleyside and Mrs. Usaher to investigate the management of county schools and send a report to the legislature.

Mrs. La Barre, who is connected with the missions of the children's welfare of the mothers' congress, addressed the audience about the work of the mothers and of the missions that they were to fulfill. Miss Emma Wold spoke on the state university and its need of support and a resolution favoring liberal appropriations was adopted.

COLVIG NOT APPLICANT FOR CITY ATTORNEYSHIP

Judge Colvig is not an applicant for the city attorneyship. For some days past the talk of the streets has had it that the place will go to one of three attorneys, Hoggis, Withington or Colvig, with Hoggis as the most likely choice. A published newspaper story had it that these three had presented their applications for the place, a statement to which the Judge takes exception. He has made no application. Mayor-Elect Elbert is not ready to make any announcement as to probable appointments and the matter of the city attorneyship and chief of police is still in the air. Considerable sentiment in favor of retaining Chief Hittson is apparent, but the matter is of course entirely up to the new mayor.
